A LITTLE OF EVERYTHING.

TOPICS OF INTEREST GATHERED FROM FAR AND NEAR FOR REPORTER READERS.

The Americans have paid the ransom demanded by the brigands and now Miss Stone is free.

The Rideau Record of last week contains a two page photograph of Mr. Andrew Carnegie, the Scotch emigrant boy who is now one of the richest men in the world.

The Legislature has sanctioned the project to run an electric railway from Toronto to Brockville and Cornwall via Smith's Falls. The cost is estimated at \$8,000,000.

Rev. Mr. McAmmond, of Almonte, who resigned from the pastorate of the Methodist church there, has, at the unanimous invitation of the Board and members, consented to remain another year.

Commencing with last Monday all mail matter will be weighed for one month. This is the decision of the Post Office Department as it will enable them to accurately judge what the remuneration to the railways should be.

From the Public accounts report of Ontario for last year just issued it is gleaned that the following grants were given to the public libraries in this district: Almonte, \$162; Arnprior, \$152.65; Lanark, \$169.10; Kinburn, \$89.60; Kemptonville, \$120.70; Perth, \$117.10; Smith's Falls, \$200; Carp, \$81.25; Carleton Place, \$160.

IMPROVE YOURSELVES.—If people only knew the value of time! A half hour each day given to the vanquishing of some real books in history, science, literature, is three hours a week, is more than twelve solid days a month, is more than two solid days a year. SUCCESS OF YOUNG MEN.—In an address in Toronto recently upon "A Young Man's Opportunities and his Responsibilities," Mr. J. W. Flavell warned young men of being led into folly of worshipping at the shrine of money. Many young men made the mistake of confusing between their desire to occupy a place and their capacity to fill it. It was a common thing to seek influence to reach a coveted place, of which the seeker was not worthy. Comparing opportunities in Canada with those of other countries, Mr. Flavell said: "Trace the extent of this great country, think of her resources, think of her mines, her fisheries, her forests, her streams and lakes, her seaboard east and west, her great and fertile plains, and then get down on your knees and thank God you are a citizen of no mean country, a citizen of a country with possibilities and opportunities for young men second to none in this wide world—opportunities in letters, in academic life, in municipal life, in parliamentary life, where men of character and purpose are sorely needed; opportunities in business, in finance, in transportation and all its possibilities. Everywhere there are opportunities, everywhere the field is ripe unto the harvest, and only wanting men. And to you comes the opportunity of supplying the need by fidelity in everyday life and action to the best that is in you."

The Liberals secured control of the standing committees in the senate at this session for the first time since confederation.

—Mrs. Vanloon has sold her house and lot in Delta to S. R. Gilbert, and with her family has moved to Brockville to reside.

The residence of Mr. John Avery, two miles east of Mallorytown, was destroyed by fire Sunday morning between one and two o'clock. It was a frame building and it together with the contents were a total loss. The occupants had barely time to escape in their night clothes. The cause of the fire was owing to a defective chimney. The loss, which is over \$2000, is partially covered by \$750 of insurance.

UNITED WORKMEN.

Annual Grand Lodge Meeting—A Record Year—4,848 New Members—Progress all along the Line—New Officers Elected.

The Ancient Order of United Workmen for the Province of Ontario met in 24th annual session in Toronto last week. About 500 representatives—picked men from the subordinate lodges—were present and manifested a deep interest in the business. The reports of the Grand Officers for 1901 were exceedingly satisfactory, showing a year of exceptional progress in this pioneer of fraternal insurance societies. Grand Master Workman Capt. T. M. Cornett, Gananoque, in his annual report says: "We have been able to pay all death claims from the receipts of 12 assessments, one a month, and have a balance at the end of the year of \$71,636.28 after paying all claims passed upon. Further on he says: "I am pleased to report that from every section of our jurisdiction the most encouraging reports have been received" and "during the two years that I have had the honor of presiding over the A.O.U.W. we have had a large increase—5,019 applications in 1900 and 5,459 in 1901—the largest number in a single year in the history of the Order in Ontario." Referring to the annual reports of the officers he adds: "Our system is one of the most perfect. It is a question if there is another organized company or corporation in existence that gives a more detailed statement of all transactions than that given by the financial officers of the A.O.U.W. of Ontario."

These facts gleaned from the very complete report of M.D. Calder, Grand Recorder, will interest not only members of the Order but the public generally. The members initiated in 1901 was 4,849. Members in good standing Dec. 31, 42,552. Average age of new members 29y, 10m, 14d. In 1901 there were 29 new lodges organized. Total lodges in Ontario, 449. The Reserve Fund is \$229,345.69. Paid in 1901 for 337 deaths \$636,000.00. Average age at death, 51 yrs, 8mo, 7dys. Amount paid for deaths since organization \$6,839,108.24. Cash received in 1901 from all sources \$724,323.41. Death rate 8.13 per 1000.

Dr. J. M. Cotton, Grand Medical Examiner, makes very full report on each death. Chief among causes of death are: Tuberculosis 38, accidents 34, heart disease 30, cancer 28, Bright's disease 17, apoplexy 13, diabetes 4, appendicitis 8. It is interesting to note the ages at which members died: 11 members died between 18 and 24 yrs; 5 between 25 and 28; 12 between 30 and 34; 26 between 25 and 39; 29 between 40 and 44; 40 between 45 and 49; 47 between 50 and 54; 62 between 55 and 59; and 104 at the age of 60 years and over.

In dealing with proposed amendments to the Constitution, Grand Lodge decided not to admit women, not to start a sick benefit branch, not to change the rates this year, not to longer debar residents of the Yukon from membership, not to make an extra call for the Reserve Fund, not to start a fund for aged and infirm members, not to issue \$3000 or \$4000 certificates. It decided to hold the annual sessions

Very many farmers in Eastern Ontario are still adhering to the very foolish policy of marketing hogs that are too light in weight, and quite unsuitable for packing purposes. The Geo. Matthews Co., Ltd., report that during the month of January their receipts of hogs graded as follows:

Selects	1398
Light	1840
Light fats	699
Heavy fats	27
Sows	40
Stags	6
Cripples	21
Stores	123
Total	4154

Out of 4154 hogs only 1398 or about 33% were suitable for the manufacture of first class export bacon. If the trade in Canadian bacon is to be increased or even maintained at its present volume, it is absolutely necessary that only hogs of proper weight and quality should be sent to the packing houses.
