London, Oct. 7.—Ada Cavandish, the actress, whose serious illness was announced in the despatches some days ago, is dead. Ada Cavandish was the widow of the late Frank Marshall, co-writer of the "Horse" series, and was known in America as the Merry Merrick of Wilkie Collins, the New York Times.

The Venetian consul at Cardiff has written a letter to the press giving a history of the boundary dispute between Venetia and Great Britain.
