From Jaff to the Bench. Francis Pemberton (1625-97) was imprisoned in the Fleet for debts contracted during a period of youthful extravagance. While in jail he applied himself to the study of law and came to be regarded as a kind of legal oracle by his fellow prisoners, who nicknamed him Counselor. With the fees they gave him for legal advice he bought books to continue his studies. He then prevailed upon his creditors to grant his release from prison that he might the sooner earn money to pay off his debts. Called to the bar in 1654, after a brilliant career in the palace court at Westminster and subsequently in the house of lords, he became a puisne judge. He was knighted in 1675 and ultimately, on the dismissal of Scrozgs, was made lord chief justice in 1681.

NO SESSION ON SUNDAY ABSULT

Japanese and Russian Envoys Take a Day's Rest.

Feeling Is More Hopeful - Official Statement Given Out That Japan's Position In Corea Was the First Discussed - Sunday's Meeting Was Postponed Owing to Russian Reverenge For the Holy Sabbath.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 14—No progress has been made with the peace negotiations over Sunday. They stand exactly where they did Saturday night. The session of the plenipotentiaries, which was to have been held yesterday afternoon, was postponed by mutual agreement out of reverence to the fact that it was the holy Sabbath, which is iniversally observed in Russia as a

The Russians had not been anxious for a session yesterday, and in the morning the Japanese took the initia-tive, and through the intermediary of Mr. Pierce it was decided to postp the sitting until this morning. The situation, therefore, remains the same. It would perhaps not be too much to say that the general feeling is more hepeful in spite of the open prediction made by men connected with both sides of the negotiations that before next Sunday the plenipotentiaries will reach an impasse, where a rupture will become inevitable.

The following official statement was The following official statement was issued yesterday:
"By mutual agreement of the plenipotentiaries of Japan and Russia it has been decided to postpone this afternoon's meeting until te-morrow morning at 9:30. The first condition upon which the plenipotentiaries spent four hours of discussion yesterday without reaching a final conclusion was the reaching a final conclusion was the one providing for the recognition of Japan's preponderating position in

Witte Delivers His Reply.

Portsmouth, N. H., Aug. 14.—The meeting of the peace conference Saturday morning was brief. It lasted a little more than an hour. The Russian reply was delivered by M. Witte, and the meeting was adjourned to give and the meeting was adjourned to give Baron Komura and his colleagues an opportunity to examine the document. M. Witte indicated courteously that he would expect the same expedition in the January was the back hears of the Japanese response as had been ob served in the preparation of the Russerved in the preparation of the Russian reply, and this was readily assented to. Baron Komura announced that they would be prepared to meet the Russian plenipotentiaries again at 3 o'clock Saturday afternoon, or if not then, at the latest to-morrow (Sunday).

Saturday's Second Session. Portsmouth, Aug. 14—The second ession of Saturday's peace conference began at 3 o'clock in the afternoon, At the first session held during Saturday the Russians handed a reply in writ-ing to the Japanese. The Japanese re-mained at the navy yard to discuss it, after saying that they would reply Sat-urday afternoon or to-day. The Rus-sians returned to their hotel.

About noon Saturday it became gen-enally known that the Japanese would have something to say about 3 o'clock. The prompt action of the Japanese, taken together with the statement that Mr. Sato, the secretary of the Japanese mission, made immediately after the first conference, that he was pessively. mistic as to the coming result, created an impression among those interested that the conference would fail. This, opinion seemed stronger among Rus-sians than the Japanese. Some of the more prominent of the Japanese held that the Russians would declare and continue to declare that the terms were unsatisfactory until Japan made a formal statement that if its terms were not agreed to, negotiations would be declared off. This they maintained was the only way to bring Russia to

From this it is assumed that the Japanese are prepared to yield or have reason to believe a way will be found to overcome the objections of their adversaries when the crucial test comes.

The debate in Saturday's conference over the first condition—the recognition of Japan's "preponderating influence" over Corea, involving her right to control of administration of the hermit kingdom, and the use of the lit-

mit kingdom, and the use of the lit-toral for strategic purposes, etc.—was of a remarkable character. Indeed, the position taken by M. Witte was sensational in the extreme. His argument might be summarized as follows:

His argument might be summarized as follows:

"Russia has no objection to Japan taking Corea, but you must avow it plainly. If it is to be taken it should be taken officially, so that the world will understand. You propose to take possession of the persons of the entire administration of the kingdom from the Emperor down to the smallest of the people. Corea will have no representative abroad who can explain the situation from the standpoint of the Coreans. All of which means Corea is to belong to Japan. So be it, Russia will not object, but Japan should avow a purpose which is against the interests of Europe and America, and especially against the interests of the United States, China and even your ally, England. If this is satisfactory to Europe and America, Russia raises no protest. You propose to destroy every vestige of the sovereignty of the Emperor of Corea, but you desire to employ a formula which will conceal your true purpose. In Christiania and other cities the total population turned out, everyone wearing long streamers of the national colors and pictures of Premier Michelsen.

said to the Associated Press last night:
"The result surpasses the most sanguine expectations. The next official steps will be taken after the Storthing steps will be taken after the Storthing meets, on Aug. 21, when the result of the plebiscite will be communicated to Sweden through the Swedish Cabinet and Riksdag. The Storthing will repeat the request that the Riksdag declare the Riksdag inoperative and the union dissolved. The Storthing will also express a willingness to negotiate concerning the details of the dissolution. cerning the details of the dissolution. It is the earnest desire of Norway to conclude the dissolution amicably. Norway will never retract, but everything will be done to meet the wishes of Sweden in other directions. If peace depends upon abolishing the forts they will be abolished. Norway must remain a Monarchy; the people do not desire a republic."
