## BOARD OF TRADE.

A general meeting of the Board of Trade was held on Monday evening in the Assiniboia Hotel. Present: D. Milne, President; W. T. Finley, M.L.A.; L. B. Cochran, Dr. Smyth, O. W. Kealy, C. S. Fingle, E. L. Crawford, W. Cousins, T. Tweed, J. H. Collier, E. J. Fawcings, O. R. Mitchell, secretary.

On the motion of Dr. Smyth, seconded by Mr. Kealy, it was resolved that the President, Mr. Finley and Mr. Tweed be appointed a committee to draft a resolution in reference to getting the Grand Trunk Pacific to come into Medicine Hat, and forward the same to Mr. Walter Scott, M.P., and ask him to bring it to the notice of the G.T.P.

Messrs. W. Cousins, E. J. Fawcings, and O. W. Kealy were appointed a committee to meet a committee which the Town Council will be asked to appoint, to seek to the best means of urging the Dominion Government to build a traffic bridge over the Saskatchewan river at Medicine Hat.

On the motion of Mr. Finley, seconded by Dr. Smyth, the secretary was asked to write Commissioner Perry, R.N.W.M.P., urging that additional police be stationed at Medicine Hat, particularly to control the north country.

A motion by Mr. Fawcings, was carried that the Secretary write the warden that the company asking what prospect there was of the warden will be being started, and stating that the Board of Trade are willing to recommend to the Council that the mill be furnished with gas free of cost.

## CUSTER SCOUT'S SUDDEN END.

A message from Touchwood, N.W.T., dated Nov. 22, says: John Colton, a rancher residing near Kutawa, was accidentally killed last night. He had been out shooting, and on his return laid his gun on the table. His eldest daughter, not knowing it was loaded, picked it up, when it slipped from her hands, and striking a chair was discharged, the contents entering her father's back, killing him instantly. Mr. Colton was formerly one of General Custer's scouts, came to Kutawa two years ago from near Sioux City, Wyoming. He leaves a widow and four children.

## An Old Story Re-told.

A few days ago we came across a volume containing the story of the Springfield Colliery explosion, a disaster which sent a terrible thrill throughout the continent. The Springfield mines are situated in Nova Scotia, and the explosion occurred on the 21st February, 1891. The story of the calamity was written by R. A. H. Morrow, and was published at St. John's N.B.

"No event in the history of Canada startled the nation and touched the hearts of all classes more than the terrible calamity at Springfield Collieries. By this dreadful catastrophe 125 brave miners lost their lives, leaving destitute 235 orphans, widows and widowed mothers to mourn their bereavement." (Author's preface).

The book is of thrilling interest and contains many narratives of personal bravery on the part of survivors and rescuers, and from these we take the story of the heroic conduct of Dan Robertson, now a resident of Medicine Hat, and well known to hundreds of our readers. The story, which is accompanied by a portrait of "Dannie," is as follows:

"Little Dannie Robertson, who is justly called the boy hero of the disaster was driving a train of empty boxes into the level on the west side. He was sitting on front of the foremost box, when, in a moment, without the slightest warning, he was struck by the terrific blast of fierce flame, and knocked backwards into the box. His light was put out, and his horse 'Jennie,' which he drove, was killed instantly. After lying in the box for a few minutes in a state of bewilderment, he was brought to a true sense of his perilous situation by crashing of timbers and the roof-fall around him. On springing from the box he discovered that his clothes were on fire, his horse dead, and he alone in the awful darkness, and the roar of the mine falling round him.

Under such circumstances, with heroic effort he threw off his burning coat and vest, and, with hands and arms painfully burned, he started to find his way out of the pit. But he had only gone a short distance when he heard the piteous cries of little Farris, the trapper, whose life was saved by dodging under his seat, coming from a distance, and rushing to the place, and groping around in the dark, found the victim almost frightened to death. By this time Robertson's hands were so painful with the burns that he was almost delirious and could not take hold of the boy to assist him out, but with unflinching courage he sat down, telling the lad to get on his back, which he did, and supporting him in position as best he could ran with his precious burden until he gained the bottom of the slope, and leaving the lad at this place of safety, he hurried after the safety of the brother John, and was about to return into the level to search for him, when some of the rescue parties caught him, placed him in a box with other wounded, and had him taken to the pit head with-out delay, where his brother was awaiting him. On their way home, little Dannie requested the man who took him home on a sled that he be allowed to walk into the house alone, so that his mother might not be alarmed. As the heroism of this brave boy is, perhaps, unparalleled in history, an effort should be made at once to reward his bravery to some suitable way."

The subject of the above now resides with his parents, and the rest of the family in Medicine Hat, and is a conductor on the C.P.R.

## FAT STOCK SHOWS FOR THE TERRITORIES.

The Territorial Department of Agriculture is arranging to hold a number of live stock judging schools throughout the Territories during the coming winter, concluding the series with two or more large meetings at central points—one in the West and one in the East—probably at Calgary and Regina. In order to make these two large meetings more complete, and to provide a wide range of animals for use in demonstration lessons, it has been decided to hold a fat stock show in connection with each of them. The idea is to start them in a small way and allow them to expand from year to year as circumstances permit. It is not the Department's intention at these winter shows to duplicate the prizes offered at summer fairs, on the contrary the prizes will be limited to fat stock, the object being to encourage winter fattening. The full classification and exact amount of prize money to be offered has not been finally decided upon as yet, but for the information of those who have put up stock to fatten, or may yet do so, it may be stated that there will be classes for the following:

Pat Steer, two years old and under three.  
Pat Steer, one year old and under two.  
Pat Heifer, three years and over.  
Pat Heifer, two years old and under three.  
Pat Heifer, one year old and under two.  
Pat Cow.

In all these classes a first prize of at least \$25 will be offered, with suitable success to one receiving out to fourth and fifth places.

In swine equally substantial prizes will be offered for:

Best pen of three Farrow, suitable for bacon purposes, and to weigh between 180 and 220 lbs.  
Best pen of three Sows, suitable for bacon purposes, and to weigh between 180 and 220 lbs.

In order to put all feeders on an equal footing it is the intention to have all animals collected at a nominal rate, on much the same plan as hulk, are at the farthest point from the place where the show is held any more to ship his animal or animals than one close by.
