HENRY LONDON GETS THREE YEARS

Sentence is Generally Considered Light in View of the Gravity of the Offence

At the session of County Court held at Woodstock last week, Henry London, a prominent farmer, and erstwhile highly esteemed resident of Windsor, was found guilty of the revolting charge upon which he was apprehended, and was sentenced to three years hard labor in Dorchester penitentiary. In sentencing him Judge Carleton said:

"Henry London, you certainly must understand the gravity of the offence you have committed. You have ruined your two daughters, you have disgraced your family and dishonored the good name you had in your neighborhood. I regret to have to impose this sentence upon you. I could sentence you to fourteen years and order you to be whipped. While the jury has decided that you are not insane in the legal sense, and knew what you were doing at the time you committed the offence, your actions show you are insane in another sense and you are travelling the way that will lead you to the Provincial Hospital. I will sentence you to the Dorchester Penitentiary for the term of three years."

The jury who rendered the verdict was composed of: W. B. Bel-yes, G. Everett Green, Cook Boyer, Burral Hatfield, Robert Jones, Allan Good, Ernest Hallett, Alex. S. Benn, Ronnie Tracey, Colin Van Wart, Burns Campbell, and William Balmain.

Commenting on the case, The Sentinel says:

"Accused of a crime, the most terrible in the whole category, one London is to be tried at the present sitting of the county court. It is a most disgusting case, and no condemnation can be too caustic, or punishment too severe for this peevish degenerate. It almost seems that we are not yet far out of the dark shades of barbarism."

The Press fully concurs with all the foregoing, baring the last sentence, and adds:

"A man like London, a religious fanatic if you will, a peevish-ling, gospel expounding, holier-than-thou insect, committing the offence that he did, the last time on a Sunday night, needs a knock on the head... which would more quickly make him sane than three years in the penitentiary. He is the type of scoundrel of the times of a Sodom and Gomorrah."

London, vile and monstrous as he is, has relatives and worthy family connections quite innocent of any connection with his degraded and unnatural behavior. They should not be branded with his conduct, and to save these innocent ones, the whole shocking affair should for the future have the curtain tightly drawn.

The case of William Rockwell of Simonds, charged with a crime against a girl under sixteen was not completed for the reason that Rockwell, to use the common phraseology, "jumped his bail."

A train service on the Valley Railway from St. John to Centreville was inaugurated yesterday. The train leaves St. John at 1:30 p.m., reaching Fredericton at 4:30. GRENIER TO HANG ON DEC. 16

Jury Find Him Guilty of Murder

After being out for almost two hours the jury in the trial of Joseph Grenier for the murder of Felix Francoeur returned the verdict, guilty of murder. The prisoner received the announcement calmly.

The prisoner took the stand in his own defence and pleaded justification on the ground of self-defence, but though his story awakened some considerable sympathy, having on witnesses to support his story and several strong witnesses against him, his plea was unavailing.

The old man almost in a spirit of resignation to his fate, waited during the two hours of the jury's deliberation with the some impassionate calm with which he heard the verdict. While much sympathy is felt for the old man, who is more than seventy years of age, public sentiment seems to approve of the finding of the jury.

Grenier is lodged in the jail at Andover and is receiving careful kindly attention from the authorities who have a man looking after him.

On Friday Judge McKeown sentenced Grenier to be hanged at Andover on Dec. 16.

Enjoyed Chautauqua

Many people from here availed themselves of the opportunity for holidays and profitable entertainment by attending the Chautauqua at East Florenceville and Woodstock. East Florenceville people are endeavoring to secure a sufficient number of guarantors to warrant the engagement of the Tent Chautauqua—the same thing on a much larger scale—for next season. Death of Well Known Conductor

Conductor Charles McGibbon, for 25 years in charge of the train on the Gibson branch, was on Tuesday evening seized with apoplexy when he was near Southampton, and died before he reached his home at Fredericton. He was one of the best known officials on the road, and years ago ran a train on this division. His demise recalls to mind the late Conductor Robert M. Dow, who for many years had charge of the express running through here, and who died quite as suddenly from a similar cause.
