PREPARING FOR THE VANCOUVER EXHIBITION

Vancouver, B. C., Aug. 27—His Royal Highness, the Duke of Connaught has advised the Vancouver Exhibition Association that he will be very pleased to open the fair on the night of September 3, by pressing a button at Rideau Hall at Ottawa and thereby sending the electric spark all the way across the continent to open the gates of the exhibition grounds, and flash on thousands of electric lights.

The opening ceremonies of the Vancouver Exhibition, like everything else appertaining to that exhibition, will be more elaborate than any yet held in Vancouver. Some of British Columbia's best speakers will take part in that ceremony, and a feature will be the singing of the mass chorus of school children.

The big pavilion, which stands just opposite to the grandstand, will be used for the opening ceremony.

Sharp at 8 o'clock Vancouver time, and 11 o'clock Ottawa time, His Royal Highness will press the button which will release dozens of electric switches on the exhibition grounds, thus throwing the fair open to the public.

The opening ceremonies of the Vancouver Exhibition will be informal and the public will be admitted free of charge on the opening night.

SUGAR MAY DROP.

Ottawa, Ont., Aug. 27—The price of sugar may come down within the next few days. Two things caused the rise. One was the increase in the Canadian duties. The other was an order made by the British government forbidding the exportation of raw sugar from the British West Indies which have been the chief source of supply of the Canadian refineries.

Sir George Foster announces that the embargo has been lifted and that Canadian refiners are now at liberty to bring in raw sugar from the southern islands.
