BOGUS MONEY GETS MANY TAKERS

Ottawa, Feb. 24.—Ottawa has been fairly flooded during the past two weeks with hundreds of dollars' worth of bogus money. As a result the merchants of the city have suffered a considerable loss.

Almost every day a large number of supposed \$10 United States bills have been cashed in Sparks and Bank street stores. The "con" men in all instances would not demand the current exchange rate, which would amount to about \$1.40. Later the merchants found out that the bills were a simple fake, as the one dollar sign had been covered over with a tobacco stamp.

Police officials have been unable to put an end to the flow of counterfeit money and, as a result, many of the uptown stores have been done badly. The police advise merchants to make a close inspection of all United States bills which they cash.
