THE CIVIC SITUATION. Actually the citizens of this town have a higher duty to perform now than they have on April 18. In other words they can be of more service to the town now than on election day by seeing to it that competent men are nominated to represent them on the board of aldermen. Any ratepayer possessing the necessary property qualification is legally entitled to run for aldermen although he may lack every qualification to serve in the capacity of alderman. Of course a man who takes the notion that he would like to be an alderman considers himself as competent for the post, as some of the men at least, whom he desires to oppose. But as in everything, there is always a best and always a worst to a field of aldermanic nominees. Unfortunately, however, the public will not discriminate between the good and the bad on election day. Countless petty reasons intervene to stop them from acting according to the dictation of reason and judgment. There was a very good illustration of this truth a ccunle of years ago when Mr. Howard Williston was defeated at the polls after serving one year at the board. Mr. Williston was a most energetic and competent alderman and was generally recogniz ed as such. Still, for some ulterior reasons, apparently, he was thrown down. Of course if such is to be the fate of all earnest and faithful workers of the Council board it will some day be very difficult indeed to bring out men who are really qualified to become aldermen. The town may find itself in the throes of bankruptcy by that time and the men who now shirk their responsibilities wil! be glad to take over the reins of government.
