SOUND REASONING

The opinions expressed by Senator Robertson of Welland, and by Senator E. D. Smith of Winona that the expenditure of public money for the building of hydro radial lines to duplicate existing government lines is unsound and likely to cost the public very heavily, is the view held by many persons who give the whole matter unprejudiced thought. Senator Robertson pointed out that there was rapid advancement being made in motor truck service and in improving public highways and these two factors must be reckoned with in calculating the earning power of railways yet to be constructed.

These features have frequently been drawn to public attention by The Journal and they are strong enough reasons to make municipalities hesitate to assume very heavy liabilities for the construction of lines that will parallel Grand Trunk

rails, since the latter road is now a publicly owned and operated utility, or at least will be when the transfer formalities are all through. The electrification of the G. T. R. between St. Catharines and Hamilton and Toronto could be made to meet all present day requirements and save a plunge by Ontario into an eleven million dollar debt for another railway.

AN EFFECTIVE REMEDY

The potato boycott in Detroit has thus far proven very effective. It shows what united action and firm resolution on the part of consumers could do if it were exercised in other directions for the purpose of reducing the cost of living. As an evidence it may be quoted that the market opened there Thursday with the price at \$5 a bushel as against \$7.50 asked on Wednesday. There were no buyers for the offending spuds even at this reduction. It was not till the holders cut their price to \$4.25 that there were sales and then not many. This represents a decline in price of \$3.25 a bushel. There is no family that could not get along without potatoes for a week or two, and if such action were taken there would soon occur a great decrease in price.

In London, Ont., it is proposed to form a union of mothers clubs to take similar action to that in Detroit. In some places in the United States overall organizations are being formed to force down the price of clothing and the result is said to be equally influential with the boycott on potatoes.

The buying public should always bear in mind that the law of supply and demand largely determines prices. So long as people pay what is asked and buy everything whether it is absolutely essential to life or no so long will the price of commodities remain high.

ATROCITIES CAUSE REDS

TO GET READY TO FIGHT

DUSSELDORF, April 16.—The digging of trenches near Caringen and Kaiserswerth has been prevented by the militia. About 6,000 reds have collected in the region of Schquim, Barmen, Elberfeld and Remscheid, resolved to offer extreme resistance. If the Reichswehr advance, the number of reds will increase to 10,000. If the retiring troops from the Barmen district will join the red army, the number may reach 35,000.

The report persists that Russia officers in uniform are partaking in the red mobilization.

Belgians have not moved across the bridge but the reichswehr continues to extend its field. The minister of the interior's amnesty proclamation has resulted in thousands of workmen returning to Essen where immediately a majority were arrested, beaten and kicked, several were shot without trial by the Reichswehr. Headquarters of the Worker's Central Council now is in Barmen. Ludwig, Ernst, Düwell, Stern and Eckhardt, communist leaders declared the reichswehr must quit the industrial zone. They said the one defeat had not killed the workmen movement, but had only encouraged them to try again and that they were more than ever against militarism and the monarchist reichswehr.

Asked for an opinion of the French occupation they replied: "Germany soon will realize it was the government's breach of faith with us that brought this about."

Michael Pints swears his wife, Mary, a Red Cross nurse, was shot at Pulkam after she and two others were maltreated.

The Haltern 65 canal workers were fired on with machine guns. They fled into barges, whereupon the reichswehr hurled hand grenades on the barges killing all the fugitives. Her man Schopper of Borbeck testifies a man named Wiesman, fearing atrocities, fled; the reichswehr troops shot him in the leg. A lieutenant kicked the wounded man and shot him through the head.

In Recklinghausen the citizens sent a committee of six to negotiate a truce. The committee was attacked, ran into some bushes, and were shot. Near Dinslaken Carl Schoen, his wife and son and son-in-law were murdered. None was a red.

A woman who had peeled potatoes for the red army was executed.

The reichswehr killed eight workmen from the Wolfshank coal mine in Sterkrade, nearby, Wilhelmmina

COMMISSIONER HIGGINS
HERE TO CONFER ON SAL-
VATION ARMY MATTERS

Com. W. J. Richards, head of the Salvation Army in Eastern Canada

and Col. John McMillan, Chief Secretary are conferring with Commissioner Higgins, Chief of Staff and Second in Command of the Salvation Army for the work who arrived in

Boston from London, England, recently. Com. Higgins came to America to discuss matters pertaining to Salvation Army affairs in Canada and the United States, with Commander

Eva Booth, head of the Salvation Army in the United States and with the Canadian officials. He was for many years Chief Secretary of the United States and recently succeeded Com. Howard as Chief of Staff and Second in Command. Many matters having any important bearing upon the future policy of the Salvation Army, and its reconstruction work are to be taken up at this meeting and it is expected that on his return Com. Richards will have something to say in regard to the questions affecting the policies to be followed in Canada.

Penalty

Every person required to file a return who fails to do so within the time specified is subject to a penalty of Twenty per cent. of the amount of the tax payable. Any person, whether tax payer or not, who fails to make a return of his income as required by the Act, shall be liable on conviction to a penalty of \$100 for which the default continues making a false statement if any information required by the Act is furnished, or to a fine not exceeding \$10,000, or to imprisonment or to both fine and imprisonment.
