LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

The Doherty organ factory at Clinton, Ont., was partially destroyed by fire Sunday night.

The Dominion Iron and Steel Company shipped 4,600 tons of pig iron from Sydney to England last Thursday.

A DISCOVERY of galena is reported at Aspy Bay, C.B. The ore is said to yield sixty-four per cent. of lead, besides silver.

REVISED figures of the population of Ontario place the total at 2,382,000. The province will be entitled to 88 members at the next parliament.

ERNEST Craswell, a young man employed on the Hillborough Bridge Works, got his right hand caught in the machinery of the mill a few days ago, getting a finger bone badly broken.

MAYOR Morris, of Ottawa, in the police court there on Saturday, pleaded guilty to purchasing liquor after hours. He was fined five dollars and costs and this disqualifies him as Mayor for two years to come.

WILLIE McLeod, the ten year old son of Mr. Neil McLeod, Summerside, had his arm broken at the wrist while returning from school a few days ago. The accident was the result of rough handling on the part of a bigger boy.

A SAN FRANCISCO newspaper prints an unconfirmed story from Skagway that Yukon miners are collecting arms preparatory to overthrowing Canadian government in that district and establishing a republic. The story is not believed.

THE steamer Alameda, owned by Strong Bros., of Cape Traverse and formerly employed in the ferry service between West River and Charlottetown has started an opposition ferry service between Sydney and North Sydney. She will likely get a good share of the travel.

A FIVE years' test of the crescented Canadian apron as road pavement, made in Trafalgar Square, London, England, shows a wear of only three-eighths of an inch. The city engineer of Westminster recommends it as eminently suitable for paving purposes in English cities.

THE Dominion Government has allowed the city temporary use of the Marine Hospital at the harbor's mouth to be used by the city in case of outbreak of small-pox. It was inspected on Monday by a committee appointed by the city council, who reported that with a few repairs it will be quite suitable.

A DESPATCH from St. John's, Nfld. says the barquentine Titania from Liverpool for St. John's was wrecked on Saturday morning near Cape Race. One man lost his life. The rest endured a terrible experience on the wreck for thirty-six hours, lashed to the rigging. They were rescued on Sunday morning.

H. GAYLORD Wiltshire, an American millionaire, socialist, is in Toronto, for the purpose of arranging for the publication of his paper called "The Comrade," in Canada. He has been refused the privilege of the United States mails and Wiltshire seeks to get back through the medium of the mailing courtesies existing between the two countries.

THE Norwegian Steamer Ella, chartered by the Black Diamond Line, is a total wreck on the Newfoundland Coast. The crew perished. The last Montreal early on Friday morning with a general cargo for St. John's. She was under charter of the Black Diamond Line, 901 tons register, commanded by Captain Danzig and carried a crew of 25 men.

A MEDICAL man in California gives this prescription as a safeguard against small-pox: "Place one ounce of cream of tartar in sixteen ounces of water, and take a tablespoonful three times a day, and you may sleep with a small-pox patient with perfect impunity. If every citizen would do this for fifteen days, there would be an end of small-pox in any city."

HARRY Hyde, traveller for Miller Bros. & McDonald, Sydney, has mysteriously disappeared. Hugh McCulloch of the same town has also been missing for the last fortnight and it was thought he had met with foul play, but on Saturday he was located at Hawkesbury. He is working on the railway there and was quite oblivious of the sensation he was creating.

A SYDNEY despatch of the 18th says: The schooner Christie Campbell, commanded by James McAdam, of Sydney bound from Georgetown, P. E. Island for Sydney, with a cargo of produce, struck the Grand Narrows bridge yesterday afternoon and five minutes afterwards went to the bottom. The crew of five were all saved, though some were injured.

THE victorious fifteen of St. Dunstan's College who wrestled the football championship of the Island from the Abegweit, together with Rev. Father Gauthier and Gallant were banqueted at the residence of Mr. Maurice Blake last Wednesday night. A very enjoyable time was spent. The collegians have challenged the Wandsworth of Halifax for a match there on the 22nd, and Dalhousie College on the 23rd.

THE Patriot reports that while John McKinnon, son of Mr. Chas. McKinnon, Lot 61, was attending a threshing mill the belt flew off and he ran to the breast. Immediately as he grasped it the fly-wheel broke, and flew in all directions some pieces going 40 feet, while one large piece struck Mr. McKinnon heavily on the side, bruising him badly. Fortunately for him no bones were broken and although severely hurt he is doing favorably well under the skillful attention of Dr. Robertson, Montague.

NELLIE McCree, aged 11 years died from the effects of vaccination at Sydney, on Thursday. Some three weeks ago she was vaccinated on her left arm, and for several days was quite ill, but revived, and all was right in a few days. On Sunday last she was again taken violently ill, took jaw set in, and she was unable to take nourishment, and death was momentarily expected, but she remained alive until Thursday, when she died in great agony. Death is said to be due indirectly to vaccination, but directly to lock jaw and blood poisoning.

LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Mrs. Robertson, living on Grafton Street, West, fell down stairs a few days ago, breaking his leg.

It has been officially announced that the steamer Stanley will be placed on the Summerside-Cape Tormentine route, whenever the summer navigation closes.

A SOCIAL and concert in aid of the church at Fort Augustus, will be held in Donagh school on Monday evening the 26th inst. A good time is guaranteed to all who attend.

DURING this season Mr. S. H. Jones has shipped by the Northumberland from Summerside a total of 12,600 head of sheep and 8000 live geese. He made his last shipment of geese yesterday.

THE Furness Line steamer Ulunda sailed from Liverpool, England, for Charlottetown on the 17th inst. and is due to arrive here about Dec. 1st. She will take a cargo of general produce from here.

THE dwelling house of Mr. Haggan, Mount Tryon, was burned to the ground on Friday night. The house was unoccupied at the time and a quantity of furniture was destroyed. The fire is thought to have been the work of an incendiary.

THE steamer Yarmouth arrived here yesterday afternoon from Boston. She sailed on return this morning with a cargo consisting in part of 2,300 cases of canned meats and a large consignment of bacon for the Glasgow market. This is the Yarmouth's last trip here this season.

ON Monday evening next, D. A. McKinnon, Esq. M. P., will lecture in Kensington Hall on "Coles and Whelan," in aid of the building fund of Indian River Church. A basket social will follow. A special train at tea party rates, will leave Summerside at 7.30 local, to return after the entertainment.

THE following health officers for this Province have been appointed by the Government: Souris, Dr. Houston; Georgetown, Dr. Stewart; Tignab, Dr. Wickham; Alberton, Dr. Ross; Summerside, Dr. Stewart; Charlottetown, Dr. Conroy; Murray River, Dr. Barnes. An additional officer is to be appointed at Summerside to inspect all sailing vessels arriving here, and health officers are to be appointed for other centres.

A new bell, weighing 800 lbs. recently imported from Ohio for St. Margaret's church, was solemnly blessed on Sunday last by his Lordship, Bishop McDonald, assisted by the pastor, Rev. Peter Curran, and Revs. Dr. Curran and P. C. Gauthier of St. Dunstan's College. High Mass was celebrated by Rev. P. C. Gauthier, who also preached an eloquent and appropriate sermon. His Lordship, the Bishop briefly addressed the congregation, encouraging the people to devote themselves to agriculture rather than seeking employment abroad. The collection taken up was more than sufficient to pay for the bell and defray the expenses of placing it in position.

A YOUNG man named Ramsay, son of Mr. Albert Ramsay, near Ellerslie, is said to have met with a severe and painful accident a few days ago, by which he lost one of his feet. He, with others, was engaged in threshing, when he noticed that one of the horses had become fractious. He sprang up on the tread mill to catch the horse by the head, and in doing so made a misstep and his foot was caught in the machinery. He threw himself back and held on to the fence with a desperate grip, and thus saved himself from being drawn in and crushed to death. As it was his foot was literally torn off and crushed to pieces. Surgical assistance was procured as quickly as possible, and at last accounts the unfortunate young man was doing well.—Agricola's Journal.

CONSIDERABLE alarm was caused during the past week when it was learned that the schooner Mentor, from Lunenburg, which arrived at Georgetown last Wednesday had a sailor named Ingleton, on board suffering from a malady resembling small-pox. The fact of there being sickness on board was made known at the Customs House by some of the crew who roved ashore, the schooner being anchored off Dr. Stewart then went on board and found symptoms of small-pox. The authorities were notified at once and the vessel placed under quarantine. On Saturday morning it was ascertained beyond a doubt that the man had small-pox. A meeting of the Health Board was held and it was decided that the vessel be provisioned and sent to Pictou. The schooner returned from Pictou and went into quarantine at Keppoch and the patient was placed in the Marine Hospital there. This is near the harbor's mouth, opposite the block house. It is about four miles from Charlottetown and is completely isolated.
