We regret to have to record the death of Hon. F. de St. C. Breckon, Postmaster of this city, which occurred at an early hour this morning. He had been ill and gradually sinking during the past ten days. He was 74 years of age and had been Postmaster for about 19 years.

Within the past few days intelligence of the relations between Russia and Japan have been of the most bellicose character. So imminent had hostilities between these two powers seemed that one report on Monday stated that war had been declared by Japan.

A declaration of war does not, however, seem to have been made, although on both sides the most active preparations in that direction are announced. It is stated that the Russian fleet is ready; that it is lying with steam up, and the vessels pointed as to be in marching order.

In supply considerable progress was made. Millions of dollars for harbors and rivers were voted, but in many cases the opposition were unable to secure any information as to the nature of the works to which the money would be devoted.

The minister of militia made a general statement in regard to his department and proposed many changes. Hon. Col. Tisdale, ex-minister of militia, pointed out many defects in the management of the department.

Railway subsidies aggregating \$13,027,000 were brought down, making total vote during the present session \$208,667,164.

by train, and those that stood by the broken down boat proceeded on their way to their destination Sunday night. The City of Augusta, of the Savannah line, which proceeded to sea Saturday night, was sighted early Sunday, returning to Sandy Hook. She was running away from the storm, but after remaining in port a couple of hours Captain Burgage started on his course for Newport News and Norfolk.

The northeast gale that had raged along the Virginia coast from Thursday had practically spent its power by Sunday night; but for miles along the Virginia coast the beach is littered with wreckage, and throughout this entire section of the country devastation lies in the wake of the storm. Thousands of people crowded trains to the coast and saw the wrecks of the big barges, Ocean Bell and Georgia, near Virginia beach. There is nothing left but an indiscriminate tangle of debris along the shore at Danneck to mark the end of the three masted schooner Nellie W. Howlett. The body of Captain George R. Evans, of the Georgia was washed ashore late Saturday night. The rescue of three negro survivors of the Georgia was most heroic. Surfman Capps of the Sea Tack Station while two miles from any other human being, and patrolling his stretch between the stations, saw a negro over a hundred yards off shore in a roaring surf. Without a moment's hesitation he stripped and plunged into the sea that was already a seething mass of wreckage from the barges, and after a half hour battle brought the unconscious man ashore. He had not recovered his breath before he discovered through a rift in the spume another form, and once more he went into the surf. He eventually succeeded in saving the negro. Placing both men under the lee of a cliff he saw the third negro in the waves, and for a third time plunged in and brought an unconscious man ashore. Capps did not cease his work until all three men had been cared for at the station, and at midnight he resumed his regular trick at patrolling the storm swept coast.

Foster Goes to England

Toronto advices say: Hon. George E. Foster, ex-minister of finance, who for the last two years has been living quietly in Toronto devoting himself to various business interests, will again enter politics this time in Great Britain, in association with Mr. Chamberlain, who has asked for his assistance in the presentation of his campaign. Recently a deputation officially from Mr. Chamberlain, as president of the British tariff reform league, came to Canada to invite Mr. Foster to join with the league in agitating his policy from public platform in Great Britain. Mr. Foster was in doubt for a time whether his business responsibilities would permit him to leave Canada, but he has at length decided to accept the invitation and will sail for England on the 17th inst. Mr. Foster's present intention is not to remain in England longer than six weeks, though his stay may be prolonged should it be found advisable. It is quite possible that he will return to England again later on.
