On motion of the Leader of the Government the act respecting the Legislature was read a second time and committed to a committee of the whole.

House met at 11 o'clock Saturday forenoon. Dr. Dewar presented a petition from Hiram Hazard and other for the incorporation of the Bonobu Black Box Company.

The orders of the day being called, the Leader of the Government introduced a bill to amend the charter act 1911 which was received and read a first time.

Adrianope Has Fallen.

After one of the most stubborn defenses in the history of warfare, Adrianope, the Turkish stronghold, fell into the hands of the Balkan allies on March 29th.

Eat Raisins.

An annual event in California during this month is held on April 30th, and is known as "California Raisin Day."

Turkey has conservatively accepted the terms of peace proposed by the powers.

Morgan's fortune is estimated at from twenty-five to three hundred million dollars.

Rhodes Curry plant at Halifax, which nearly all their stock was destroyed by fire yesterday. Loss is about \$50,000.

Rev. Dr. McMan who had been benighted at Quebec, Montreal, returned home Saturday.

The steamer Natsuar, the first steamer returned for the season, left Quebec for Gulf of St. Lawrence on Monday.

The Governor General and suite arrived in London, from Canada on Sunday afternoon last, all well.

Field Marshal Wolsey the great British General, died at Nice, on Tuesday of last week. He was about 80 years of age.

It is reported from Madrid, that King Alfonso of Spain was rather seriously hurt while playing golf on Saturday.

The Alberta Legislature has been dissolved and a general election is on. Nominations of April 17th, and polling week later.

"Red and White," St. Dunstan's College, recently was held on our desk some time ago. Its literary contents are of a high order of merit.

The Pope resumed his audiences Monday indicating that he has practically recovered from his recent illness. The Pontiff appeared to be in excellent spirits.

A contract has been awarded by the Federal Government to McHughall Bros. of Ottawa for locks, dams, etc., in the channel between Pictou and New Glasgow. The contract price is \$350,000.

On Thursday afternoon last, the remaining spire of the Cathedral, was successfully spliced from its position on the tower and fell crashing into the ruins. It was shattered to pieces by the fall.

J. Pierpont Myrland the great American Senator died in Rome on Monday last. He had been in poor health for some time and had been travelling in Europe in search of relief. He was about 70 years of age.

The Minot, after arriving here from Pictou Monday and loading mails and passengers, and discharging cargo, left for Summerville to break the ice barrier at the entrance of the harbor. She returned here shortly after 10 yesterday and after taking in mails and passengers left for Pictou.

A rear end collision occurred between two freight trains on the Intercolonial, near Capleton on Saturday afternoon. Several cars were derailed and a van and motor caught fire. The train was torn up some distance blocking traffic for some time. In consequence of the wreck the Joan Limited eastward bound was delayed four hours.

While on their way from here to Ottawa last week Senators Prowse and Murphy were travelling on a Grand Trunk train that met with an accident and several were injured. Senator Prowse was injured somewhat, but Senator Murphy seems to have escaped unhurt. It was marvelous that no one was killed, as the train was going at a rate of 40 miles an hour.

Federal Parliament.—The House of Commons has been voting supplies for a few days. The supply bill covering the six months of the whole supply agreed upon, was introduced Monday of this week. Yesterday the House considered a resolution and bill respecting the Japanese treaty, and it is likely that the navy bill was again being read today.

The British steamer Cassandra scheduled to sail on Saturday from Glasgow for St. John, N. B., did not get away. While being hauled out in mid stream preparatory to her departure, she collided with the dock wall and received damage to her bow which compelled the steamer to return to her berth. Repairs will be made before proceeding to her destination.

The Forty Hours Devotion opened in the pro-Cathedral on Monday of this week, with high Mass of Exposition, at 10 o'clock. The MISSA PRO PAPE was celebrated at 8 o'clock yesterday morning and high Mass of Exposition was sung this morning at 9 o'clock. Rev. Maurice McDonald was celebrant on Monday, Very Rev. Mgr. Gillis on Tuesday and Rev. A. J. McDonald this morning. The Blessed Sacrament was exposed in procession at 10 o'clock on the opening and closing days. A number of priests from the different parishes were in attendance and all were busy reading confessions during the day and in the evening. The first Masses, were at 8 o'clock in the upper church and in the basement. The church was thronged with people from early morning to late at night.

Limitation of Secular Teachers.

There are three main causes for loss of faith among our Christian youth attending the higher instructions of the secular schools.

The first I would call an exaggerated opinion, on the part of the student body, concerning the competence of their teachers to pass irrevocably upon all philosophical and religious problems.

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Another danger is the false presumption of youth, a weakness almost universal in our day. How often do we see young men of immature mind, of superficial knowledge and limited experience, daring to settle of hand, with impermissible assurance, questions bearing on God, Christ, His Church, religion in general—questions which an Augustine and a St. Thomas would approach only with hesitation and after long reflection and painstaking investigation.

If want of respect for authority, and ignorant contempt of tradition have sown evil fruit in many fields both speculative and practical, they have brought havoc and ruin in the religious and moral spheres.

Want of Moral Stamina.

The third danger to which faith is exposed arises from the want of moral self-restraint. Impley is often born of vice. The depraved will readily believe the theories which favor license. How is it that this young man, hardly out of a Catholic college, loudly proclaims his independence from God and His Holy law? He is fashioned theological and philosophical questions? Has he tried them critically and found them wanting? No he is but struggling with a mere text-book on Common Law or on Medicine and still he is without faith, he has abandoned all religious practices, he cares little for God and his immortal soul. The paradox, however, is easily solved. Religion is forsaken because found too exacting. He will prefer scepticism or nihilism that he may be free from the obligation his faith imposes of living a noble and Christian life. Some one has wisely said that if the propositions of Euclid were at the time moral precepts they would have long since been denied.

We trust that you the students of this college dedicated to St. Thomas, the Angel Doctor, who united in his life in such a high degree, profound learning, unbounded faith in God, deepest respect for the authority of the Church and genuine humility, will be so vitally impressed by his example that at an hour like this even one of you will find in the ranks of those who have rejected their priceless inheritance to follow the false prophets of a new age, by giving credence to the delusive promises of an intellectual and moral license which will bring you nothing but spiritual desolation and death.

From the Flooded Districts

From the western States, the news on Saturday showed that the flood's waters had reached sufficiently to show that the number of persons drowned in all the affected cities in Ohio and Indiana may not exceed 500.

While many persons are still missing to friends and relatives, investigations made to date indicated that many were safe who had been thought lost.

In Dayton careful estimates placed the number of deaths at 200 or fewer, although a meeting of the undertakers asserted that the total might be 800.

In Columbus 62 bodies have already been found.

Unverified figures from Miami, Ohio gave 50 dead, but in all other flooded districts, the figures fell off rapidly.

Hamilton, Ohio, which had reported as many as 250 dead, did not put forth any figure today.

Mount Vernon did not confirm its previous report of 50 dead and no confirmation was had for 32 reported drowned at Venice Ohio.

Chillicothe and Tiffin Ohio, where there had been reports of 50 or more dead, each found eighteen corpses up to midnight.

The best figures from Piqua give a death of toll 50 persons. Fremont and Middletown, Ohio, each have 14 dead, Masson, five Zanesville 4, and Troy 9.

The Indiana total drowned receded to fewer than fifty, distributed as follows: Peru, 20; Brookville, 16; Fort

Wayne, 6; and Terra Haute, 4.

No bodies have been found in West Indianapolis, where as many as 200 deaths were at one time reported.

With the situation somewhat alleviated in the flood-swept districts of Ohio and Indiana a new menace has threatened in the rise of rivers in the southern valleys of both States. At Cincinnati, the Ohio caused alarm and although the situation had not yet reported an acute stage, reports from the neighboring country towns indicated that the warning had been issued to the inhabitants to seek points of safety from the rising waters.

In Indiana alarm was felt in the valleys of the Ohio, Wabash and White rivers, but ample warning served in a measure to reduce the panic. In the mean time floods and storms had invaded New York State and the New England States, during much damage. Up to latest news no lives had been lost here.

PUBLIC NOTICE

By an Act of the Legislature of 1906 and amended in 1912, Births occurring in Prince Edward Island must be REGISTERED WITHIN THIRTY (30) DAYS OF THEIR OCCURRENCE, and DEATHS WITHIN SEVEN (7) DAYS, with the District Registrar, who is also Road Master for the district.
