Mr. W. Heribson, of Goderich town-  
ship, had the misfortune to lose a \$30  
bill in Clinton the other day.

Miss C. Martin, of Bayfield, has been  
soured for S. S. No. 3, Stanley town-  
ship, instead of Goderich township, as  
stated, at a salary of \$250.

Mr. Jos. Gibson, of Vancouver City,  
B. C., who has been visiting friends in  
Ontario this summer, is at present at Mr.  
H. Gibson's, on the 9th con., Tur-  
berry.

The Seaford football club scored a  
grand victory at Berlin on 26th ult.,  
beating the celebrated Rangers of that  
town by a score of three to two. The  
Rangers were justly proud of their victory.

Mr. Will Wallace, formerly of Clinton,  
but more recently a commercial travel-  
er, has settled down to business in To-  
ronto, where he has opened out for him-  
self.

Wm Scott, Brussels, who has been  
laid up for several weeks with a broken  
leg, started to work last Monday. He  
is employed at Smith & Malcom's fac-  
tory and is a first-class mechanic.

Last Sunday afternoon Arthur, the  
four-year-old son of Andrew Crozier,  
Brussels, fell on the road while going to  
Alex McLaughlin's and broke the small  
bone in his left arm near the elbow.

Mr. George Lavis, of the Huron Road,  
Goderich tp., has leased his farm to Mr. R.  
Lawson, at an annual rental of \$90.

The death of Mrs. J. Anderson, near  
Belgrave, was very sudden, week before-

and there expired. Her son, who is

the 26th of October, and was buried the

the entire satisfaction of the Building  
Committee. The building is yet to be  
seated, when it will be ready for ded-  
ication. A meeting concerning the re-

tives from outside being present, but  
what course will be pursued has not  
been learned.—Clinton New Era.

The crop bulletin of the Manitoba De-  
partment of Agriculture for October  
states that the average yield of wheat  
per acre for the province is now placed at  
12.4 bushels, oats 16.8, barley 13.6,  
potatoes 11.9. The average yield of wheat  
per acre from 1883 to 1887 was 20.6.  
It was perhaps the worst on  
record, drought throughout the summer  
having done an immense amount of de-  
struction, and yet notwithstanding the  
unfavorable conditions Manitoba has  
come through much better than Dakota.  
The official figures for that State re-  
cently issued make the average yield of  
wheat in North Dakota 10.06 bushel,  
and in South Dakota 8.66 bushels  
per acre, while the Manitoba average is  
12.4 bushels.
