Personal Patriotism.

This was the subject of Hon. Jno. Harvey's address on Sunday afternoon at the Congregational Church, P. S. A. It was the obvious duty of every citizen, whatever the extent or importance of the work he could do, to do something for the betterment of the social conditions of the Colony. The conditions which affected public health here were bad. They were bad elsewhere, too, but in large cities the public conscience, in many cases, had been pricked, and definite attempts were being made to alleviate the evils. In some respects conditions were as bad in this city as anywhere, but he would not attempt to catalogue these evils. A broader system of education, the development of observation, and thought, would tend to produce a public opinion which would insist on the amelioration of our sanitary affairs. If our people were educated, would they see the pebbled drains, the catch-balls for refuse and dirt, would we still have the sanitary cars and paper from them blowing all over the city, or to see the sidewalks covered with expectorations, or witness the extraordinary number of drunken men, or men in receipt of good wages on the border of poverty? If this town were properly educated, these things would disappear as the snow in summer. Tuberculosis and infantile diseases were the prolific causes of our high mortality. They were sapping our vitality. The A. P. C. was trying to do a good work in combating this evil through the agency of a trained nurse, and he would like to speak for a few moments on this subject, (1) because he would like to interest his hearers in it, and (2) because it was evident from the work of the nurse that the establishment of some home for those afflicted with this disease had become an absolute necessity. The moral of all these things pointed to personal patriotism. After the address, Mr. Ray pledged the P. S. A. to help along the A. P. C. The music was given by Messrs. H. and W. T. Courtenay, S. J. W. Tucker and Roy Kendall. Next Sunday Capt. A. Keen will speak on "Achievement."

France and the Vatican

PARIS, June 5.
While semi-official Vatican reports from Rome deny that any arrangements between the Government of France and the Catholic Church will ever be possible without direct negotiations with the Pope, there are the best of reasons for believing that a considerable section of the French episcopal continues in its endeavors to induce the Vatican to modify its hitherto intransigent attitude. It is certain that the Government has indiscreetly advised the French Bishops that it is willing to treat with them but not with the Vatican on certain points.

Revolutionary Movements.

NANKING, China, June 5.
A revolutionary movement (would-be) inaugurated to-day, the date set for the opening of the Exposition. This ceremony was carried out without the slightest disorder. Foreigners have been warned not to interfere in any way with the military preparations. This warning has not served to allay them to any extent, and Chinese merchants who a few days ago were leaving the city are now returning. The situation is not considered serious.

French Antarctic Expedition Back.

ROUEN, France, June 5.
The steamer "Pouquet" Pas with the Cheroot Antarctic Expedition on board arrived here to-day. The party was given a hearty reception and was received by the Geographical Society of Normandy and a delegation representing the Government, headed by the Mayor, who presented a medal of honor to all the members of the expedition.

Lumber Mills Burnt.

SOUTH MALLAND, N. S. June 5.
The Anthony lumber mills destroyed by fire this afternoon and property valued at \$100,000 was burned with insurance of half that amount. The mills are the finest in Nova Scotia with the exception of the Davison Mills at Bridgewater. A Shornesley, the principal manager of the Company and one of the chief shareholders in the corporation had been over the mills after luncheon at 1 o'clock when everything appeared right and safe. At 2.30 o'clock fire was discovered and so sudden was advance of flames that by 3 o'clock the whole mill was in ashes. What caused the outbreak of fire is an absolute mystery. The mill was built 5 or 6 years ago and owned largely by American capitalists.

Airship Visits London.

LONDON, June 4.
An army airship made a surprise reconnaissance over London during the night. Leaving Aldershot at 11.30 o'clock last evening, the aerial craft started for London during the night in the teeth of a stiff breeze. It reached St. Paul's two hours later and circled over the Cathedral at a height of one thousand feet. Returning the air craft arrived at the barracks at 3 o'clock in the morning. The distance between Aldershot and London is about 35 miles and the time made by the airship first against and then racing with the wind is considered excellent.

The Cretan Question.

King George of Greece arrived here to-day in the strictest incognito to confer with King Victor Emmanuel regarding the Cretan situation and to urge that Italy as one of the four protecting powers of the island to assist in the realization of the Cretan ideals.

The Diana Returns.

Job Bros. & Co's. s.s. Diana, Capt. Newbury, arrived here at noon to-day from Blanc Sablon. She left here Thursday week and arrived at Blanc Sablon on Saturday, May 28th. She had it foggy on the way down, and calling at Trinity, Hant's Harbor and Heart's Content, brought down Mr. Grant and 230 fishermen to prosecute the voyage this summer at that place. She left there Saturday at 5 p.m. and had fine weather until yesterday, when she had a strong breeze of E. wind and high sea. She leaves here again shortly and takes 100 persons down from Trinity Bay.

FISH IN STRAITS.—The s.s. Diana reports a good sign of fish in the Straits, especially about Port au Choix, Port Saunders and St. John's Island. It has been the finest winter and spring ever experienced in the Straits. The weather is mild and fishing operations will start earlier this season than ever before.

Schooner Ashore.

The schr. Western Queen, belonging to Mr. T. Flynn, went ashore at Langley, St. Pierre, yesterday in the fog and storm. She had 550 qtls. of green fish on board and was on the way from the Gulf to Mortier Bay. The skipper, Robert Lundrigan, telegraphed to the owner, Mr. M. T. Flynn, who is in the city, saying that the schooner was full of water but that there is a possibility of floating her. All the gear and outfit was saved except the 350 qtls. of fish. The keel and the rudder are gone. The Western Queen is a new vessel built last year and is covered by insurance.
