### Nelson Shields for the Colony.

We are authorized to state that this Colony has been brought into the great plan of issuing shields made from the copper of Lord Nelson's own flagships to the British Empire. Rev. Alfred Hall, of Durban, South Africa, the originator of this patriotic movement, visited Newfoundland in July, and now informs us that the shields have been offered to every Board of Education in the Colony. In South Africa the schools gave \$25 each for the shields. In Canada Lord Strathcona's munificence enabled them to be obtained on special terms. After full consultation with Superintendents of Education, it has been decided to offer a shield together with \$2 worth of the Nelson souvenirs for prizes for \$5. to each school. Six months are given in which to take advantage of the offer, and it is hoped that every school in the Oldest Colony of the Empire will get one. All proceeds of the movement go to the welfare of the Sailors' Home and Institutes of which the King is Patron.

### Splendid Local Tomatoes.

Yesterday we were shown some splendid tomatoes which came from Mr. Grace, which were grown at the farm of Dr. Goodwin, Dentist, of that town. The doctor raised these as an experiment and so pleased is he with the result that he will grow them on a large scale in future. The soil is exceptionally adapted over there for the propagation of these vegetables at Harbor Grace. The doctor has also raised some fine pumpkins and apples and has also experimented in the raising of corn and achieved much success in the production of this cereal. The doctor is an expert agriculturist and believes that the soil in the country about Harbor Grace is rich and splendidly adapted to the cultivation of a variety of fruits, vegetables and cereals.

### Heroic Rescue by Life Savers.

Boat was Capsized, but All the Crew of Barque Record Saved.

Louisburg, Sept. 20.—Further particulars from the scene of the wreck, states that the Record is a steel barque of 1,300 tons, registered in Lvedstrand, Norway. Capt. Grendsen, bound from Bahla Blanca, for a St. Lawrence port. The crew of sixteen have been landed at Mainadieu. The ship is in a very exposed position surrounded by breakers, and will be a total loss.

Captain Grendsen speaks in the highest terms of the courage of his rescuers. When Capt. Martell first arrived on the scene with his life saving crew it was impossible to board the ship, but after standing by for some time an attempt was made to get along side which proved successful, but as the first boat load, eleven of the crew were leaving the ship, the boat overturned and the men thrown into the water. The life boat righted, however, and with the assistance of Captain Pope of the Western Light and his two sons in their gasoline boat, were again rescued, and safely landed. The captain and crew of the tug D. H. Thomas which went to the scene of the wreck rendered most valuable assistance in the rescue. With the falling of the tide the sea subsided somewhat, and the remaining five of the crew were taken off with less danger to all.

### "Punch's" Latest Strike News.

MR. ASKWITH OUT. National Consternation.

"Commercial England was thrilled this morning by the announcement that Mr. Askwith, the famous arbitrator, the keystone of the business arch, had himself come out on strike," says Punch. "The Government decided at once that every effort must be made to induce him to return to his duties. A regiment of cavalry was wired for from Aldershot, and the Chancellor of the Exchequer motored round to his residence.

"Mr. Askwith sternly declined the employers' terms — £20,000 a year plus time and a half for overtime and double time for Bank Holidays and Sundays. He made no objection to the pecuniary terms, but he insisted on a maximum of sixteen arbitrations and two thousand miles railway travelling per week, and that no working day should exceed eighteen hours. The Chancellor was compelled to refuse the terms as the Board of Trade has already 12 arbitrations in hand and fresh ones are coming in at the rate of three a day.

Later.

"A Cabinet Meeting has been called to consider the crisis. It is felt by Ministers that if Mr. Askwith does not return to work, no strike in England will ever end. The Cabinet is at present considering the possibility of nominating Mr. Askwith as arbitrator in his own strike. The difficulty is that Mr. Askwith cannot arbitrate without constituting himself a black-leg.
