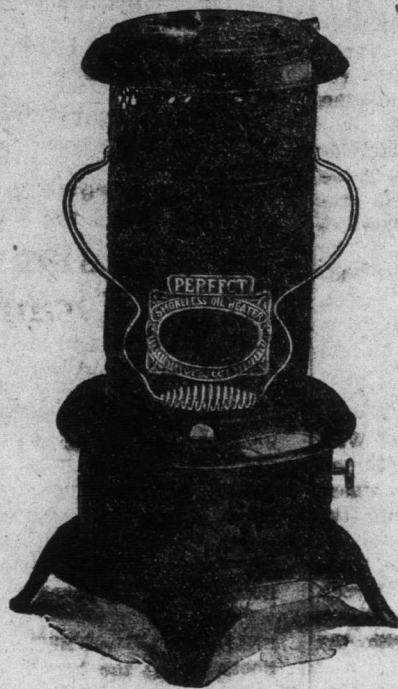

Politeness.

It is the piano finish of conversation. Politeness isn't a state of mind, but of words. Many a man can be perfectly polite and agreeable to another while he is longing to leap upon him with a hoarse growl and bite off his ear.

Politeness is the art of expressing what you ought to feel. When a man is polite and expresses it at the same time, he is a perfect gentleman. When he only expresses it he is a cold imitation. Sometimes the imitations sell for higher prices than the real things in the marriage market. With the aid of politeness a man may make his way pleasantly through a maze of perplexing world, getting what he wants and having his own way. Politeness is a greater asset than financial ability. The financier has to work for his money, but the truly polite man can allow others to work for him and can make a life-long friend of a creditor by the beautiful way in which he apologizes for not being able to pay him.

Some people wear their politeness all the time, while others take it off like an overcoat when they become heated and use the plain unvarnished sword. After using politeness constantly and to excess for a few years a man's feelings and his conversation become total strangers and have to be introduced when they meet on rare occasions.
