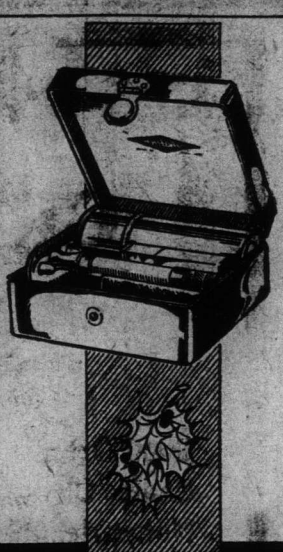

Ten Greatest
Inventions.

The Scientific American offered
prizes for the three best essays on the
ten greatest patentable inventions of the
past twenty-five years. No two
competitors selected the same set of
inventions. In fact, only one inven-
tion, that of wireless telegraphy, was
conceded unanimously to belong to

the group of the ten greatest. The
vote on aeroplanes was almost unani-
mous. But beyond that there was no
unanimity.

The conditions of the contest stated
that greatness would be measured in
terms of practical success and com-
mercial usefulness to mankind; the com-
petitors were limited to machines, de-
vices, and discoveries commercially
introduced in the last twenty-five
years and special emphasis was laid
on the fact that the inventions must
be patentable, although not neces-
sarily patented.

The following twelve inventions se-
cured the highest number of votes, the
number printed after each represent-
ing a per centage of the votes given:
—Wireless telegraphy, 87; aeroplane,
75; X-ray machine, 74; automobile,
68; motion picture, 62; reinforced
concrete, 37; phonograph, 37; incan-
descent electric lamp, 35; steam tur-
bine, 34; electric car, 34; calculating
machine, 33; internal combustion en-
gine, 33.

The Greatest
Living Player of
Chopin's Works.

It is difficult to find anything fresh
to say about Mons. de Pachmann,
who gave his last recital this season
at the Queen's Hall yesterday after-
noon. There was the usual vast au-
dience to listen to the greatest living
player of Chopin, and to watch his
eccentricities. He was in his most
exuberant mood, but, although con-
sciously or unconsciously, a great
deal of the "showman" appears in his
performance, it is only fair to add
that this quality is never allowed to
detract from his merit as a genuine
artist. He played Weber's Sonata in
A flat, and pieces by Moczukowsky,
Imboden, and Mendelssohn, but the
chief interest of the concert lay in
the Chopin group.

The British Chamber Music Play-
ers gave the first of a series of three
concerts at the Bechstein Hall yester-
day afternoon. The joy and vitality
of Beethoven's Trio in E flat (Op.
70) for piano, violin, and violoncello
were vividly expressed by Messrs.
Herbert, Sharpe, Albert Sammons,
and Cedric Sharpe. It is not an easy
work to play, and not only were the
technical difficulties overcome, but
the players obviously possessed just
the required amount of mutual sym-
pathy and understanding. Mr. Her-
bert Sharpe played Schubert's Pos-
thumous Sonata in B flat, and the
programme contained also a Trio in
G minor by Sir Charles Stanford.

A feature of the next concert, to
be held on December 10th, will be a
group of piano pieces, never yet
heard in this country, by Moussorg-
sky. The third concert is fixed for
January 28th—Graphic, Nov. 20.

SIR M. J. BRUNEL died 1849, aged
80. English engineer and constructor
of the Thames tunnel finished in 1843.
His son designed the steamship "Great
Eastern."

ROBERT BROWNING died 1889,
aged 72. Great English poet, whose
earlier poems and dramas were far
from popular, mainly because of a
somewhat obscure and involved style
from which he only occasionally freed
himself. From 1864 to 1870 he pub-
lished many works and had the satis-
faction of feeling at last what it was
to be a popular and appreciated poet.

His "Men and Women," and "The King
and the Book," among some of the
finest poetry of modern times.

SIR WM. JENNER died 1898, aged
83. For many years Physician in Or-
dinary to Queen Victoria and King
Edward VII.
