No Terms and No Retreat.

There are special reasons in the German mind why we should be morally and mentally shamed and dishonored beyond any other people—why we should be degraded till those who survive may scarcely dare to look each other in the face. Be perfectly sure, therefore, that if Germany is victorious every refinement of outrage which is within the compass of the German imagination will be inflicted on us in every aspect of our lives. Over and above this, no pledge we can offer, no guarantee we can give, will be accepted by Germany as binding. She has broken her own most solemn oaths, pledges, and obligations, and by the very fact of her existence she is bound to trust nothing and to recognize nothing except that of immediate superior force, backed by her illimitable cruelty. So you see, there are no terms possible. Realize, too, if the Allies are beaten, there will be no spot on the globe where a soul can escape from the domination of this enemy of mankind. There has been childish talk that the Western hemisphere would offer a refuge from oppression. Put that thought from your mind. If the Allies were defeated, Germany would not need to send a single battleship over the Atlantic. She would issue an order and it would be obeyed. Civilization would be bankrupt and the Western world would be taken over with the rest of the wreckage by Germany the Receiver. So you see, there is no retreat possible. There are no terms and no retreat in this war.



Sagona Arrives From Labrador.

The S. S. Sagona, Capt. W. Parsons, arrived in port from Labrador at 6 p.m. yesterday having been as far north as Nain. The Sagona left here on Saturday, July 24th, and made a fine run down to Nain arriving there on August 1st. On the return south unfavourable weather was experienced, but on the whole the weather during the trip was not doing much or getting to the grounds. On the return south Capt. Parsons kept a log of the reports received at the various ports of call from Nain to Battle Harbor. The following is a copy of the report:—

THE FISHERY.

The fishery news brought along by the Sagona is anything but encouraging. Just as prospects for a good voyage were brightest a storm came on which for a whole week prevented the fishermen from hauling their traps or getting to the grounds. On the return south Capt. Parsons kept a log of the reports received at the various ports of call from Nain to Battle Harbor. The following is a copy of the report:—

Nain to West Turnavic — Just a sign when steamer coming south. Winsor's Harbor — One schooner here with 200 quintals.

West Turnavic — Bartlett's crews 200 quintals.

East Turnavic—Crews 20 to 30 qts. Ilack—Eight schooners here with 100 to 150 quintals; not doing much.

Cape Harrigan—Two bankers here, and doing splendidly with trawls.

Macotic—Very little doing; Dunn's crew, 150 quintals.

Iron Bound Island—Hertly's two schooners with 150 and 125 quintals; shoremens doing poorly.

Ragged Islands—Crews 100 to 150 quintals, and doing well.

Cape Harrison — Two schooners here with 300 and 200 quintals; shoremens doing poorly.

Sloop Cove — Kennedy's crew 90 quintals; cod scarce.

Emil Harbor—Harvey's crew 300 quintals.

Horse Hr.—Goss's crew 350 quintals; other crews 50 to 100 quintals; hook and line fishery good.

White Bears—Two schooners here with 100 quintals each; crews 20 to 50 quintals; nothing doing of late.

Smokey—Crews 100 to 150 quintals; doing fair.

Indian Hr.—Crews 100 to 150 qts.; doing fair.

Splitting Knife—Crews 100 to 150 quintals; doing fair.

Indian Hr.—Crews catching 10 to 15 quintals daily with hook and line; not much done to date.

George's Island—Two schooners here with 200 and 150 quintals.

Long Island—Crews 20 to 30 quintals.

Grady—McRae's crew 400 quintals; others 50 to 120 quintals.

Black Island—Crews 20 to 40 qts.; one crew 100 quintals.

Wolf Island—Crews 25 to 40 quintals.

Indian Tickle—Three crews 400, 300 and 250 quintals; others 50 to 120 quintals.

Red Point—Crews 150 quintals; nothing doing at present.

Dominio—Crews 60 to 100 quintals; very little doing.

Spotted Islands—Crews 50 to 70 qts. Black Islands—Crews 50 to 150 quintals; nothing doing now.

Battata—Crews 50 to 100 quintals. Flat Islands—One crew 500 quintals; others 50 to 100 quintals.
