### Head-on Collision with Shell.

With the British Armies in the Field, Aug. 30, via London, Sept. 3.—To have had a head-on collision with a big shell is an experience which has befallen few airmen in this war, but to have lived to tell the tale is all the more remarkable. This terrifying adventure recently befell one of the pilots of a noted British air squadron. He lost a foot and suffered many severe bruises, but hopes to get into service again at no late date.

It was a Major who told the story of the accident.

"It was during the bombardment of the German lines," he said, "that this pilot went up. He had gone well over the German guns and had been strafed by their 'archies.' During his flight back he came down to a much lower altitude, and was coming toward our lines at full speed when he met, head-on, a big shell from one of our own guns.

"It was a wonder that it did not explode immediately and 'blow him and his machine to shreds.' Instead, it cut away two cylinders of his engine, ranged downward and carried away his steering gear, and then blew up under the tail of the machine. It stunned him and badly mangled his right foot, which afterwards had to be amputated.

"As strange as the accident itself was the performance of the airplane. It came to earth with him in it, turned over as it landed, and he was lifted out of it through the hole which had been torn in it by the shell."

### Another Alaska Treasure.

Alaska has already returned many times the money which, when paid for it, was declared to have been much worse than wasted, and now it discloses the possession of another treasure. It is a gold mine, and the value of all of those previously taken from the frozen wilds once called worthless by all the Wise Ones. For platinum has been found there—platinum, the royal metal, to which even gold bows in humility and silver dares not even approach.

The extent of the discovery is not yet determined, but it is known to be large, and the deposits are so rich that the chemist to whom the first samples were submitted for analysis didn't have the courage to report on them lest he be thought guilty of a wild exaggeration. And the platinum now in sight is only a beginning, as was the gold in California rivers that caused the epoch-dating "rush" of '49. The real mines are back in the mountains, nobody knows just where. There the serious exploitation of the future will be done, but meanwhile the silver sands will pay again Alaska's many times cancelled debt.

It must be remembered that platinum is useful as well as beautiful and that its enormous price is fixed by the practical ends it serves in several most important industries, not by its availability for the purposes of decoration and luxury.—N. Y. Times.

### Bathless Berlin.

There would be a further saving of soap and water if Berlin would forbear to wash dirty linen in public.

skin of the black grapes and contains tannin which is good for the scalp and hair roots. The yolks of eggs or subcarbonate of soda or potash are good for very dark hair.

How fortunate you are if your hair is light, for the sun is always ready to shed its beneficial rays on your head and aid in the lightening process. The commonly accepted household bleaches—ammonia, borax and soda—will lighten and brighten the hair a little but they must be used with great care for they have a very drying effect on the scalp and, after they have procured a pretty coiffure for a few days, the hair is apt to seem more lifeless and dead than before.

A harmless mixture for lightening the hair is one made of equal parts of shubarb stalks and honey steeped in three parts of white wine. Let the mixture stand for twenty-four hours, strain and use as a lotion when the head is wet. Massage it on to the scalp and let it dry in the hair.
