A Stirring Appeal.

We most heartily and sincerely endorse the stirring appeal, made in our columns yesterday, by "One Who Knows Our Soldiers," that more attention be given the men at present occupants of the various hospitals, who fought and bled and suffered for our salvation from the horrors of German autocracy. And the request made is not by any means incapable of being granted. It is within the power of every one of the four hundred and odd owners of motor cars and other vehicles propelled by petrol, in this city to help in the just and noble cause for which their co-operation and assistance have been asked. The war is over. Yes—and luckily for us that it ended as it did with victory crowning the right. Had it been otherwise, and the legions of Kaiserism triumphant, where would have been our inherited freedom and the pleasures of liberty? Where indeed. And but for the brave lads, who are with us to-day, and millions of others of their type, who so nobly and heroically responded to the call, the iron heel of Germany's military boot would have been brought down with crushing force upon our foreheads. And for preventing this, do we not owe some gratitude to the heroic invalids now slowly recuperating their broken health, and waiting the healing of hideous wounds and for strength to be restored to maimed and mangled limbs, ere they come out of hospital to take up their place in life.

On a banner stretching across Water Street on the day of the landing of the last battalion from the Corsican, was painted these words: "Our Women and Children Thank You." Fit motto truly for the welcome of men who had performed such deeds of valor on foreign battle fields, and fit sentiment to greet them on their return. Our women and children are thanking these men to-day, as they thanked them during the dark days, and as they will continue to thank them so long as memories of their gallant deeds stir the blood. And mothers will tell the stories of their heroism to their children and so the tale of the Royal Newfoundland Regiment will be carried down to posterity, and the lustre of its name and fame will not lose aught in the telling.

But—there is something more than thanks due: something more tangible than the

expression of a mere sentiment. There are in our midst the wounded, the maimed, the halt, the broken, the blind. All these freely gave their young strength and their early manhood that we might live and be immune from Hun peril. They have come back to us out of the hell of battle, tortured in body and mind. They are not recipients of our charity—they are a first lien on all our resources. They are our everlasting creditors. We owe them more than we can ever hope to repay, and in small liquidation of our debt to them we are being asked to do but a very small thing: small in itself yet big with possibilities. Every person who is fortunate in the possession of a motor car has it within his or her power to give the men in hospital some of the enjoyment and pleasure which they long for. Take them out into the open country. Give them all the joys of a day or days spent in breathing the health-giving air of the woods and fields. Help them build up their broken constitutions, and inherit health and happiness once more. They have done all for us. Let us then do all that we can for them. In their wounds and maiming were our liberties conserved, and our account with them will best be settled by assisting them to regain that which is so necessary to their future—The Blessing of Health.

A 'Milking' Process.

The Star is desperately anxious to make it appear to the public that the Reids are running the present Government. Under the head of "Rule of the Reids," the Star said yesterday: "The Reids illegally increased their freight rates and passenger rates to an enormous extent, and 'a Minute of Council' is passed, 'making their increased legal under the War Measures Act.'"

It is clear that the intention is to make the public believe that the Minute of Council referred to has recently been passed by the Cashin Government. That is a falsehood. The increase took place during the time that Coaker (the ally whom the Star is ashamed to admit), was the reigning influence in the Lloyd-Coaker Government; and, a Minute referring to the matter, if there were any such, was passed before the present Government came into power, and no retrospective Minute is likely to be passed.

As to the complaint of the Star that the President of the Reid Newfoundland Company spends about one month out of twelve in Newfoundland, we might remark that this is more than the late President of the Company spent here; though, during his short time in the Colony, he was "milked" to get the Star on its feet, and some of the Star's friends have recently been in very close association with the ex-President.

The Electors of Keels

The Advocate, yesterday, contained a characteristic telegram from Keels, B.B. It was evidently written at Port Union, and the names appended to it may have been signed or may not by the people to whom they belong. They are made to say, "We have our eyes wide open." That is a rather curious phrase to put in the mouths of people who have heard only one side of the story, and that from very unreliable sources. Some of the phrases in the telegram are Coakeresque. Mr. Morine is said to "have insulted the man that saved his political scalp from contumely and contempt." As Mr. Morine has no scalp, apparently it is Coaker's scalp which is talked about. Mr. Morine is also said to have "tried to pry into the affairs of the Union Trading Company," in the House of Assembly. This is Coaker's way, of course, of saying that it was time that the way in which Coaker had received and spent the money of the fishermen was enquired into, for the purpose of protecting the fishermen. Do the fishermen really object to an enquiry for their benefit, or does the objection come from Coaker? Why should he object? Why should he not rather court enquiry? It is rather sad, after all, to see the names of a large number of respectable and intelligent people appended to a number of statements about which they really know nothing, except upon the report of interested parties, who are striving in every way possible to misrepresent all that has been said and done. The day is coming, indeed it may not be far off, when the intelligent electors will be very glad to be placed in possession of all the facts by all the men who are capable of throwing any light on the situation.

Methodist Educational Campaign.

Perhaps the most enthusiastic meeting in the Methodist Educational Campaign was held last evening, when the workers brought in a total of \$24,228.40, bringing the grand total up to \$177,440. Work goes on unabated. The organization is determined that the amount secured will be far in excess of the \$200,000 quota for St. John's.

The Campaign will close Monday evening, and between now and that time it is expected that every Methodist in St. John's who has not thus far had a part in this worthy enterprise, will make their contribution. The workers in the Campaign feel that the responsibility of educating Methodist children in St. John's rests no more upon one Methodist than upon another, it is the consensus of opinion that gifts differ in degree but not in kind, that every Methodist ought to subscribe such an amount as they are able.

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Fog Intervenes.

NO HANDLEY-PAGE FLIGHT YESTERDAY.

HARBOR GRACE, To-day. The weather yesterday was too hazy for a flight of the Handley-Page plane, and thick fog settling down in the afternoon rather spoiled the plans of aviators. Mechanics this morning are filling tanks with one thousand gallons of petrol, so as to have full fuel supply on board. There is no truth in the statement that the machine will fly over Sydney, Cape Breton, in the present or any other trial, but it will make a five-hour flight over St. John's for the purpose of giving the official cinematographer an opportunity to film the city from the air. A young lady from Bell Island made application for a position on the flying staff, offering her services to do washing and scrubbing during the trans-Atlantic flight, and asking for the rate of pay per month for the position. Needless to say the offer was declined with thanks and regrets that the machine did not provide facilities for the accommodation of extra help. It is quite possible that another flight test will be made this afternoon.

REPORTER.

Fishery Prospects.

A report to the Board of Trade, received yesterday, gives the catch of codfish between Gaultois and Pass Island as 10,000 qts., with 200 for last week. From 25 to 30 traps and 200 dories and skiffs are fishing. Prospects are good, and the fishermen are of opinion this will be a good year for trawls. At present there is a sign of caplin.

Bankers Did Well.

The South West Coast bankers have done remarkably well the present season, on their spring trips. The average catch is about 1,000 quintals, though some have from 1,200 to 1,600 quintals. Most of the schooners are now at their home ports refitting, and will not sail again until they get a caplin baiting. Caplin have already struck in about Lawn and St. Lawrence, but not in large quantities.

VICKERS-VIMY.

Yesterday afternoon the Vickers-Vimy plane went up for another trial test, principally of the wireless apparatus, which had been reset, not having worked well during the previous flight. The machine remained aloft for some three quarters of an hour confining flying to circling the city. Both the take-off and landing were perfect and the aviators were highly pleased with the short flight. A speed of 112 miles per hour with the wind, was attained yesterday. The Graciana brought a new stock of petrol, which will be tanked to-day, the total quantity being 1,000 gallons, sufficient to ensure enough for the trip as well as for other trial flights, should they be deemed necessary. Among the visitors to the drome on Wednesday, was His Grace Archbishop Roche, who was shown around by Capt. Alcock and the various parts of the machine and their workings explained. His Grace was very much interested.

RAYMOR.

The damaged Raymor machine has been completely rebuilt at the Blue Puttee garage, and a new engine was received by the Graciana yesterday, which will be immediately installed. When this work is finished the Raymor will be taken to its old berth at Pleasantville to undergo the necessary trials. Pilot Raynham, who suffered a number of injuries when his plane nose-dived on May 18th, is now O. K. again and is making active preparations for another start. A navigator to replace Major Morgan whose injuries obliged him to return to England, will shortly arrive. Everyone will wish Raynham better luck in his coming attempt.

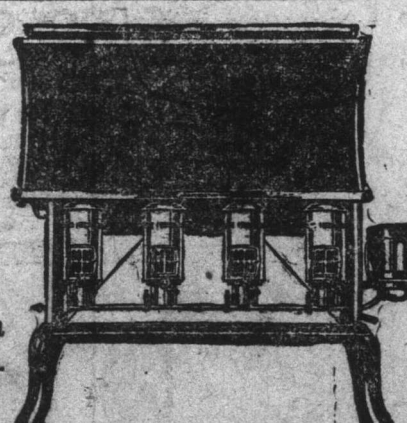

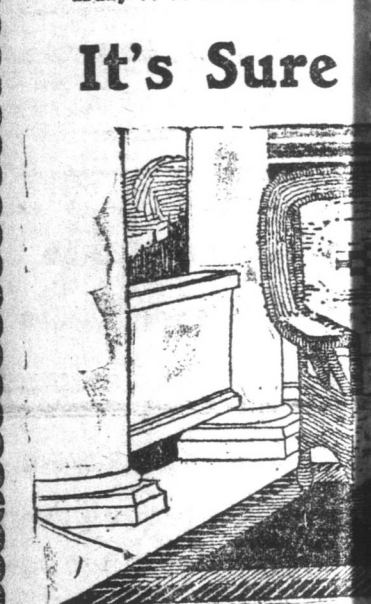
