Fog Intervenes.

NO HANDLEY-PAGE FLIGHT YES-TERDAY.

HARBOR GRACE, To-day. The weather yesterday was too hazy for a flight of the Handley-Page plane, and thick fog settling down in the afternoon rather spoiled the plans of aviators. Mechanics this morning are filling tanks with one thousand gallons of petrol, so as to have full fuel supply on board. There is no truth in the statement that the machine will fly over Sydney, Cape Breton, in the present or any other trial, but it will make a five-hour flight over St. John's for the purpose of giving the official cinematographer an opportunity to film the city from flights, should they be deemed necesthe air. Bankers Did Well.

The South West Coast bankers have done remarkably well the present season, on their spring trips. The average catch is about 1,000 quintals, though some have from 1,200 to 1,-600 quintals. Most of the schooners are now at their home ports refitting, and will not sail again until they get a caplin baiting. Caplin have already struck in about Lawn and St. Lawrence, but not in large quantities.
