Young Voters Rally  
in St. John's East for  
the Government Trio.

Despite the much-advertised entertainment at the Casino Theatre last night, the young voters of the East End (including a large and representative number of returned soldiers and sailors) filled the spacious Casino Hall where they were addressed by the "Two Thousand Majority Team" — Higgins, Vinnicombe and Fox.

Sergt. J. Robinson moved, seconded by Lance Corp. Harold Burt, of the Battery, that Sergt. Instructor Morrissey—a Blue Putte—take the chair to conduct the meeting. In the connection it is a notable fact that of all the meetings held by the Opposition since the ex-soldiers have been allowed to officials in this capacity. And the public rear draw their own conclusions. Sergt. Morrissey, in introducing the speakers, announced that he had great pleasure in so doing, knowing that the Liberal-Progressive candidates were true representatives of the people and men in whom every reliance could be placed during the reconstruction period.

The popular representative of St. John's East, Hon. W. J. Higgins, addressed the meeting, and in a speech full of fervent enthusiasm and real expression of the pleasure it afforded him in addressing such a large assembly—representative as it was of every walk of life in which our young citizens were engaged. Mr. Higgins expounded upon the "natural wealth" which this colony possesses and which only needs the resourcefulness of our young people to develop. He explained that the policy of Sir Michael Cashin is to investigate fully and accurately the extent of these resources, and apply the most up to date methods of

development. It was particularly noticeable that Hon. Mr. Higgins' address was entirely free from personal abuse and appealed directly to the inherent instincts of all present. However, in his exordium, he availed of the opportunity to announce to the Coaker-Squires combination that if the present foul tactics, in endeavour to besmirch his good name, were continued, he would deal with his opponents in a manner they would doubtless regret.

Councillor Vinnicombe followed in his usual happy vein, explaining that he was fully cognizant of the underhand game which his opponents were playing, and whilst it is ever his ambition and desire to conduct an absolutely clean campaign, yet it needs to be he was fully prepared to handle his adversaries without gloves.

He was followed by Mr. Fox, who in his usual convincing and logical manner, took the opportunity at the outset to denounce the use which was being made of one of our gallant heroes—Padre Nangle—to basely exploit the sorrows of an electorate. He then proceeded to expound the fearless, clean, upright and honest policy of the fisherman-Premier, Sir Michael Cashin, and his eloquent address was punctuated with the most sincere and hearty applause.

At the close Sergt. Morrissey thanked the young voters for their attentive hearing, and congratulated the speakers on the absolutely clean campaign which they aim to carry through.

With three hearty cheers and a tiger for Sir Michael Cashin and the Progressive Party, this most enthusiastic meeting closed with the National Anthem.

Note From  
Mr. E. J. Whitty.

At last night's meeting of the Liberal Reform Party, Hon. R. A. Squires made the assertion that a labor representative from the Labor Party came to him, asking for a place on his ticket for St. John's West. Presently he referred to me, the real truth is that Dr. Campbell and Messell came to my home, made an appointment with me with Hon. R. A. Squires in his office at 4 o'clock, that same afternoon. This was made in the presence of Mr. Healey, before going to interview Mr. Squires I went to the Consolidated Foundry to interview Mr. John Cadwell, the Chairman at that time of the Labor movement. I stated to him that I had this invitation and asked his permission, which he granted. The proposition put to me during the conference, was that the Hon. R. A. Squires would like a candidate in St. John's West, and one in St. John's East in the interest of Labor and to finance their election, place motor cars or any other conveyance at their disposal. He also promised to interest himself in the eight hour day, the chief labor and the minimum wage questions. He promised me that he would do everything to his power; for that I shook hands with him and told him that the discussion between him and me was finished, and that I would have to report the proposition to the Committee which I did. This was done and the Committee turned me down, I was not there as the representative of the N. I.W.A. I was there only as a member of the Labor Party, I had no authority from the N.I.W.A. and was there on the authority of the Chairman of the Committee.

## Obituary.

THOMAS F. VAVASOUR.

(H. F. Shortis.)

There passed away yesterday, after a short illness, fortified by all the rites of the Holy Mother Church, Thomas F. Vavasour, for the past 15 years storekeeper in the General Post Office of this city. Mr. Vavasour was born in St. John's seventy-four years ago, and was descended from one of the oldest and most respected families in the city, his father being, for many years, master cooper in the great mercantile firm of Messrs. J. & W. Stewart. At a very early age he entered St. Bonaventure's College, and was amongst that great galaxy of intellectual stars who afterwards shone so brilliantly in church and state, amongst whom we may mention the names of Rev. Dr. Doyle, Dean Doughty, Rt. Rev. Mons. Reardon, Rev. J. V. Donnelly, Rev. Father Fitzpatrick and many others who rose to eminence in their priestly lives. He was also contemporary with Blundell, Rattus, Armstrong, Fitzpatrick, W. R. Shortis and many others who have been called from amongst us. At the present moment, we can only recall two of Mr. Vavasour's schoolmates of the sixties in Old St. Bonaventure, viz. Rt. Rev. Mons. Reardon of Placentia and Very Rev. Joseph V. Donnelly of Conception Harbor.

After leaving St. Bonaventure College, Mr. Vavasour was appointed school-teacher in St. George's, during the days of the Rt. Rev. Mons. Sears, first Vicar Apostolic of the West Coast. He took the deepest interest in young Vavasour, being well aware of his high scholarly attainments.

He was a man of exceptional talent, and as a speaker he was logical, convincing and eloquent, possessing a lovely personality, a strong imagination, rich humour, deep pathos and a passionate fondness for the beauties of Nature. As a classical scholar we have no hesitation in saying that he had few equals in the country. He had a clear, cultured, incisive style of writing and a capacity for expressing himself which was noble in its simplicity. For some time past he was Secretary of the Holy Name Society in St. Patrick's parish and his annual reports of that body were remarkable for their brilliancy of composition which called forth the highest encomiums from those who had the privilege of hearing them read at the meetings. He was of a retiring nature, and invariably avoided the glare of the public calendar, but his quiet unassuming manner, his readiness to offer a helping hand to all, his sympathetic heart, coupled with his bright intellect, won for him innumerable friends and admirers, and none regret his demise more sincerely than all his associates in the General Post Office, from the highest to the lowest, who, I am certain, will join with me in the following words:—Eternal rest give to him O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him. Requisite in peace.

Funeral services will be held at 10.30 a.m. to-day at St. John's Cathedral.

## "ATLANTIC" FORCED TO LAND.

GREENPORT, Long Is., Oct. 10.

The Handley Page bombing plane "Atlantic," which was compelled to land here last night with her eleven passengers, eighty miles short of Mineola, will not resume her flight to Mitchell Field to-day, according to the present plans of Admiral Kerr, commander of the bomber. The four "Eagle Eight" Rolls-Royce engines, which had propelled a deadweight of 28,000 pounds for twelve hours against an average head wind of forty miles an hour, constituting it, is believed, a world's record, were subjected to terrific grueling and will have to be given a thorough routine inspection before another start is made. This, together with work of taking aboard three hundred gallons of gasoline and forty gallons of oil ordered from Mineola last night, will make a get-away, in the opinion of Admiral Kerr, impracticable before Saturday, at least.
