Gordon said it was in 1763 that the French King ceded to the English the whole of North America, excepting only Newfoundland, and the strip of ter-ritory known as the coast of Labrador. The Canadian Gov-ernment contended that "the coast" meant only the shore, and not the hinterland. Labrador was a desolate country, but it had one valuable and rare mineral called Labradorite. Lab-

Lady Davidson said the Newfoundland Regiment was the only regiment in the British Army to win the title of "Royal" in the Great War. She had spent five of the happiest years of her life in Newfoundland, and the Newfoundlanders were the finest and bravest men she had ever come across.
