BORDEN GOVT. GIVES NOTICE THAT IT WILL BRING ON CLOSURE BILL

Mr. Borden declared that the government's present proposal was a departure from the spirit of that resolution. In 1909 he had suggested that the contribution should be made to the empire should an emergency arise.

Mr. Borden then took up the question of representation on the imperial defence committee. Now, he was opposed to such a proposal. For what reason, he asked. For the reason, he believed, that the leader of the opposition felt that Canada should remain neutral in time of war.

Mr. Borden said that he had in 1910 brought in what was supposed to be a permanent policy, but they had not submitted it to the people. Now they were demanding that a policy that was not permanent be submitted to the people.

So far as the idea of a Canadian naval organization was concerned, he would point out that the present measure was made in response to a dispatch in the admiralty memorandum.

Medicine Hat, Alta., April 7.—Customs returns at the Medicine Hat office show a great increase for the first quarter of 1913 over the same period of a year ago. For the first three months of 1913 they amounted to \$22,400.59, against \$17,066.92 for the last year.

For the month of March this year the collections were \$22,418.21 against \$8,969.72 for March of 1912, being an increase of very nearly 400 per cent over March of last year.
