TORONTO, June 11.—A. m.—Higher  
pressure prevails over the lake district,  
and the high temperature which has been  
prevailing in the west for some time is  
slowly moving eastward and is likely to  
affect the lake district for some days. In  
Eastern Canada it is fair with moderate  
temperature. The weather is settling in  
somewhat cooler in Alberta and Assiniboia,  
but still continues hot in Manitoba.

## LONDON AND ENVIRONS.

—A portion of the new pumping machin-  
ery is being carted to Springbank.—Corp. Burns, of Wolseley Barracks, is  
enjoying a month's furlough at Niagara  
Falls.—Miss Flossie Burns, South London, is  
the guest of Miss Springer, Alma College,  
St. Thomas.—Mr. Walter C. Hurley, of Chicago, is  
the guest of his uncle, Mr. Jas. Hurley,  
211 Adelaide street.—Mr. Clifford B. Keenleyside, of Lon-  
don, who has just completed a divinity  
course at Yale, has taken one of the cottages  
on the Fraser Heights, Port Stanley, and  
will spend the summer at the Port.—James Smith and his wife left Squire  
Jarvis' court Saturday afternoon the best  
of friends. James lives east of the city,  
and had been charged by Mrs. Smith with  
assault. The matter was dropped.—George McCoomb was charged by  
Chas. Niall on Saturday with non-payment  
of \$13.65 wages. Both parties belong to  
London township, Niall being a farm  
laborer. Squire Lacey reserved judgment.—Thieves in London township are resort-  
ing to new methods. Peter Duguid, of  
con. 5, had about 50 pounds of milk stolen  
from his premises on Thursday night. A  
neighbor of Duguid's also lost a large  
quantity.—Mr. M. Moore, of London, was in  
town Friday arranging for the C. P. R.  
picnic to Woodstock on Saturday, June  
23. It is expected that there will be 500  
railroaders here on that occasion. [Wood-  
stock Sentinel-Review.]—A wheelman named Alfred Hooper was  
the victim of a race between rival butcher  
wagons on King street on Friday night.  
His ankle was run over, and as he was  
unable to walk a gentleman drove him  
home. Citizens, with the object of per-  
sisting in racing on King street and Queen's  
avenue.—The list of school grants—public and  
separate—has been published by the Edu-  
cational Department of the Ontario Gov-  
ernment. London's public schools receive  
\$3,618; separate, \$462. London West is  
benefitted to the extent of \$235, while  
Middlesex county gets \$5,523.—The Grand Lodge of Freemasons meets  
at Hamilton this year on July 18 and 19.  
Already the Hamilton brethren are moving  
to make provision for the reception of  
their 600 to 700 visitors. At a recent  
meeting R. W. Bro. John Hoodless was  
elected chairman of the general committee  
and Wor. Bro. Fred Howell secretary.—An inquest into the death of Robert  
Johnston, who died from injuries received  
on the G. T. R. near Komoka, was begun  
on Friday night by Coroner E. Cook. The  
following jury was impaneled: Messrs.  
F. Holman (foreman), John Clemens, W.  
H. May, Adam Watson, H. J. Boyd, Thos.  
Hammond, Henry Clark, Joseph Wilson,  
George W. Taylor, James Clark, W. A.  
Weir, Fred W. Parkinson, George John-  
ston, F. G. Mitchell and Peter Teer. After  
viewing the body, which was identified by  
Michael Deviney, an adjournment was  
made until to-morrow night at the police  
station.—The annual picnic of the Egin public  
schools was held Saturday at Port Stanley.  
There were over 4,000 people on the  
grounds. The Twenty-fifth Battalion Band  
of St. Thomas and the Vienna Brass Band  
were in attendance, besides a string band  
for dancing. The day was spent in  
numerous sports. The Joe Milton made  
several trips out in the lake, and was pa-  
tronized by large crowds. The cadets of the  
Collegiate Institute, St. Thomas, to the  
number of about 40, gave an exhibition  
drill under Capt. Jones. The L. E. and D.  
R. R. handled the crowd well. Three or  
four hundred from London went down.—The funeral of G. T. R. brakeman  
Robert Johnston, who succumbed to in-  
juries received on the Grand Trunk Rail-  
way at Komoka, was held yesterday  
afternoon. The cortege was upwards  
of half a mile long, and was preceded by  
about 250 on foot, representing Myrtle,  
No. 2, and other city lodges of the Knights  
of Pythias, Brotherhoods of Railway Train-  
men, Locomotive Engineers, Locomotive  
Firemen, Railway Conductors and Tele-  
graphers. Delegates from the railroad  
societies at St. Thomas and Hamilton were  
also in line. Rev. Canon Smith conducted  
the services. Bro. R. Cadwallader reading  
the beautiful Knights of Pythias ritual at  
the grave. The funeral designs were beau-  
tiful, and included wreaths from the Knights  
of Pythias, Brotherhood of Railway Train-  
men and the brothers of deceased.

Successful London Students.

London did well in the recent art examina-  
tions. The following are the results:  
London Art School—Primary course, 16  
proficiency certificates; advanced course, 1  
full certificate, 17 proficiency certificates;  
mechanical course, 1 proficiency certificate.Extra subjects—Painting, oil colors, 2 cer-  
tificates; painting on china, 1 certificate;  
drawing from lithography, 1 certificate.London Collegiate Institute—Primary  
course, 290 proficiency certificates; ad-  
vanced course, 25 proficiency certificates;  
mechanical course, 20 proficiency certi-  
ficates.Hon. Geo. W. Ross, Minister of Educa-  
tion, in his last annual report, shows that  
though only 157 certificates were awarded,  
in 1883, with one teacher's certificate, the  
total number awarded in 1893 was 5,675,  
including 324 teachers' certificates.

The L. R. E. O. P. A. Object.

The council was to have held a special  
meeting on Saturday night to discuss means  
of extending aid to the victims of the  
Fraser River flood, but a quorum was not  
forthcoming. At 8:30 the following mem-  
bers were present: Mayor Estery, Ald.  
Carrothers, Garratt, John Heaman, John  
W. Jones, Nutkins, Parnell, Pritchard and  
Shaw. It was decided to adjourn until to-  
night when the electric street railway  
question will also be debated. The follow-  
ing letter was received by the clerk: "I  
have been instructed by the Real Estate  
Owners' Protective Association to protest  
on their behalf against any grant  
being made by the City Council  
to the sufferers by the Fraser River  
floods (my clients believing and having been  
advised that such proposed grant is illegal),  
for which purpose I understand a meeting  
of the council has been called for to-night.

with the unfortunate people in their  
trouble and affliction, protest and dis-  
pute the right of the council to grant  
or apply the city money for that purpose,  
and believe that the privilege of subscribing  
towards any such fund should be left to  
each individual citizen. Should any such  
grant be made by the council I shall, in  
accordance with instructions, commence  
actions against the members voting for the  
same. Yours truly, B. C. McCANN."

## A Gross Libel Apologized For.

To ward off a libel suit the London Free  
Press has confessed that it did Mr. Peter  
Ryan, of Toronto, an injustice when it  
printed the atrocious false charge made  
against that gentleman by Mr. T. W.  
Crothers, lawyer, St. Thomas, with the ob-  
ject of bringing the Mowat Government  
into disrepute. To help the election of  
Mr. Clancy, in a speech at Thamesville,  
Mr. Crothers publicly charged Mr. Peter  
Ryan with acting as an auctioneer of timber  
put on sale by the Ontario Government,  
and it was added: "Mr. Ryan had a friend  
buy in a limit for him, and a few days  
later he sold it again, making \$18,000  
boodle out of it." The Free Press now  
says: "We find upon inquiry that the  
statement was wholly unfounded. No  
limit was purchased by or on behalf of Mr.  
Ryan at a sale at which he acted as  
auctioneer, nor at the sale at which he  
acted for the Government did he receive  
any exorbitant or improper amount of fees.  
The Free Press regrets the injurious de-  
moralizing effect of the statement made  
to Mr. Ryan by the insertion in its  
columns of this false statement, and  
apologizes to him for the injury thereby  
done to him." If all the Cabinet  
Ministers, officers of public institu-  
tions, members of Sons of England  
lodges, and of other organizations against  
whom more untruths have been made in the  
present campaign, with the object of de-  
crediting the supporters of Sir Oliver  
Mowat were to act as promptly as Mr.  
Ryan has acted, there would be a standing  
apology for misrepresentation and untruth  
in the columns of the anti-Mowat news-  
papers. Never has there been a campaign  
where more untruths have been leveled against  
the Government of the day. The one here  
apologized for is a fair specimen. It is  
proper to believe none of these ante-election  
charges unless supported by unassailable  
proof. In nine hundred and ninety-nine  
cases out of every thousand there is abso-  
lutely no foundation for these rascally at-  
tacks.
