CANNOT USE REVISED EDITION. Anglican Synod by a Large Majority Declines to Sanction Its Use in

the Church. Montreal, Sept. 16.—The principal topic of discussion at the session of the Anglican Provincial Synod came up on a motion to alter Canon 13, so as to allow of the use of the revised version of the Scriptures being read in churches where clergymen so desired.
The advocate of the motion contended that the revised version, especially of the New Testament, was an improvement on the authorized version. The opponents to the motion maintained that it would not be in the interests of the church to pass such a motion, and more particularly as neither the Sees of Canterbury or York had authorized the use of the revised edition in England. On a vote being called, the notion was lost by a considerable ma jority.

TODAY'S DEVELOPMENTS. San Francisco, Cal., Sept. 16.—The Durrant trial entered upon its ninth week this morning. A slight change in the programme for today was made necessary by a death in the family of Mrs. George P. Morgan, whose examination was not finished when court adjourned last Thursday. Durrant's defenders will be unable to persuade Mrs. Elizabeth Crossett to modify her testimony regarding her ride in a Valencia street car on the afternoon of April 3. The old lady is as sure of the day as she is of the fact that she rode on the same car with Durrant and tried to attract his attention from the girl who was with him. Mrs. Crossett's visit on the following day was to the house of her son-in-law in Alameda. The aged woman remembers the day when she went and her friends who went with her to the ferryboat corroborate her. The testimony of Mrs. Crossett will be the key to the prosecution's search.

THE MYSTERIOUS LADY. The identity of the "Sweet Pea Girl" the mysterious young lady who has constantly attended the Durrant trial and who has attracted so much attention by her devotion to the alleged murderer, has been discovered. She is Mrs. Grace Bowers, the wife of an insurance clerk. Last Wednesday she left her husband as a result of her infatuation for Durrant. Mr. Bowers says that his wife never knew Durrant, but that from the beginning she had taken a great interest in the trial and believes Durrant innocent. It is thought that her mind has become affected and that she is not responsible for her ac-

HER LIFE CRUSHED OUT.

The Terrible Death of Little Mary Newton, of Springfield.

An extremely sad accident occurred at Springfield on Friday, resulting in the death of Mary, the 5-year old daughter of Mr. D. Newton, in a most painful manner. Mr. Newton was going through a gate on a field roller, accompanied by the little girl, when, by a sudden jerk, or the roller striking some impediment, the child was thrown backwards to the ground. Mr. Newton pulled the horses up suddenly, and they backed quickly, causing the roller to pass over the child, who was picked from under the horses' feet.
