An English writing master of repute, named Frederick Falconer, had long puzzled over the question of how to provide a remedy for the distressing trouble known as writers' cramp, which lays hold of the wrist and hand of a man who is compelled to do much writing, and forces him to stop work Now, nature does not usually provide an infliction for which there is no

remedy, so argued Falconer. Like a flash came the solution of the problem; and now all the teachers of writing, bookkeeping and clerks in England are saying to each other:
"Why did we not think of that before?" Falconer's line of reasoning was simply this: Nature has provid-

Good Results in British Columbia Gold, Silver and Copper in Paying Quantities.

Rossland, Aug. 31 .- On Upper Arrow Lake a great deal of prospecting has been done this spring and summer, and the results have been very encouraging On Fish Creek, which empties into th lake, a solid body of galena seven fee wide has been opened by S. C. Chisholm and others, of Rossland. The hanging wall has not been reached, but there is enough already in sight to satisfy the owners.

The smelter at Trail, up to within th past week, has not made any effort to refine its bullion, but this week it pro duced a gold brick weighing 250 ounces, the first refined gold bullion ever produced in the province, and marking a new departure in British Columbia. The smelter at Nelson is now receiv-

ing 200 tons of ore daily from the Silver King mine. It is silver-lead ore, with gold values sufficient to make it pay well, regardless of the unprece nted decline in silver. The loss to the Hall mines by reason of this decline is estimated at \$300 per day.

In West Kootenay the investment in smelters and reduction works repre

sents \$1,000,000. On the Sunset group, in Trail dis trict, a seven-drill compressor has beer ordered, and also a new hoist. These improvements have been made neces south vein of Sunset No. 2. 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
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
