BANKS SYSTEM SANE AND SOUND

Minister of Finance Replies To Attack On Canadian Banking Institutions.

Ottawa, March 2.—The Canadian banking system, under discussion in the House today, the debate following a resolution proposed by the member for Stormont, Mr. R. A. Pringle. The resolution is as follows: "That in the opinion of the House it is an opportune time to consider the advisability of amending and revising the banks act, and that the following, among other amendments, should receive consideration:

1. To provide for Government inspection.
2. To provide more stringent regulation.

The time had come, he declared, when the great banks should be stopped from speculating. The Government, he contended, should control circulation; not, as at present, permit the banks to issue as much as their paid up capital. Not more than ten per cent of their capital and reserve should be loaned to any one borrower. The Sovereign Bank, he said, had gone to the wall because it loaned everything to two concerns. He charged that the banks were charging interest as high as one per cent monthly in Western

Canada, and as high as 21 per cent in the Yukon. While the banks were hoarding money, the banks were rate of money lenders, the banks were left free to charge what they pleased. Banks, he said, should not have the privilege of opening branches all over the country to draw in the people's savings and transfer it to financial centers. The number of branches, he contended, should be limited by the amount of capital. The present tendency would end in the creation of a vast monopoly.

Mr. Fielding Replies.

Hon. W. S. Fielding in reply said that as the Bank Act was reviewed and revised every year it was advisable to make a few changes as possible during the intervening periods. He might bring in some slight changes this session, but he did not expect any wide revision. He showed that an independent audit was open to the shareholder of any bank now, but he could not agree with Mr. Pringle's idea of Government inspection. Such an idea, he said, was unnecessary, impracticable, delusive and misleading and likely to impose an obligation upon the Government regarding the character and standing of banks which they should not assume. He defended the system of money which tended to gather up idle branches and bring it to where it was needed. Depositors in Canadian banks, he pointed out, were well protected under the present system, and all note issues were guaranteed. Shareholders sometimes lost, but they, like other business men, were taking risks to make profits. Dealing with the matter of call loans on New York the minister quoted Manager Clouston, of the Bank of Montreal, that forty-one millions was obtainable in this way from Canadian banks. That it was a new policy, and was advantageous to both depositors and shareholders, and that further this money could be quickly recalled.

Mr. Pringle asked in view of this which banks came to the Government for assistance in moving the crops. "The banks did not come to the Government for assistance in moving the crops," replied Mr. Fielding.

The Home Secretary announced that arrangements have been made for the periodical testing of motor-car taximeters. Complaints as to their inaccuracy will be inquired into by the police.

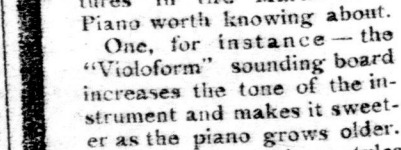

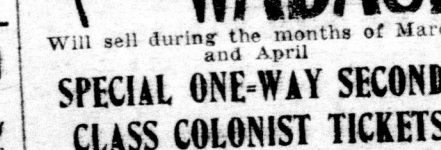
