And whereas, the provisions of this by many cases have not been complied with, and ratepayers neglect and abstain from taking out building permits; Now therefore, be it know unto all persons that the aforesaid bylaw will be rigorously enforced, and anyone infring-ing the bylaw will be prosecuted, and the penalties therein contained fully enforced. # NEW BAPTIST ASSOCIATION

A Dominion Convention Formed to Inc clude All Old Ones.

Ottawa, Nov. 5. - The Dominior Baptist convention concluded today, after drafting and accepting a constitution. This will be submitted to the Ontario and Quebec and Maritime as sociations.

.The proposed constitution provides for the formation of a Baptist union of Canada, the object being "the promotion and prosecution by the Baptist Churches in Canada of such works as are deemed in the interest of the Kingdom of God, for the appointment of delegates to the meetings of the union; for regular meetings of the union; for officers, for an executive; for boards to regulate home and foreign mission work; for Sunday schools and young people's work, Grande Ligne work and, similar enterprises."

The work of the Grande Ligne Mise sion will be under the jurisdiction of the Dominion union, but the board will be in Montreal.
