BOARD OF WORKS ARE UP TO DATE

Refused Last Night to Bar the Automobiles Out of the Parks of London.

SPEED OF FIVE MILES

Autoists Must Not Endanger the Lives of Children and Others—Board of Works Meeting.

Automobiles furnished a considerable amount of discussion at the meeting of the board of works last night, but it was decided not to interfere with the present bylaw governing the speed of vehicles in Victoria Park. According to the board's opinion an auto was a vehicle, and the by-law covered that.

Ald. Saunders thought the bylaw should stand as it was. "We do not want to keep these men out of the park so long as they do not exceed the speed limit and endanger children's lives," he declared. "Perhaps, five miles an hour is slow, but for such a short run, I do not think it would seriously effect the machines. If they want to go faster there are streets all round the park and they could take them."

Listen to This! Parks Commissioner Pring wanted the auto drivers excluded from the park altogether.

Ald. Morgan insisted that eight miles be the limit, but on motion of Ald. Saunders the bylaw was left as it was, five miles in the park, the rest of the city to be governed by the statute.

W. McFadden complained of the condition of his property on Mary street. This is the annual complaint regarding the Scanlon drain, and Ald. Tancock and City Engineer Graydon will visit the place and report to the committee.

Telephone Company's Request.

Manager Beard, of the Bell Telephone Company, will be asked to appear before No. 2 committee at its next meeting to explain the request of the Bell Telephone Company regarding its application for the privilege of placing ducts on Richmond and Dundas streets. It was stated at the committee that the company would refuse to place a duct for the fire alarm wires and the committee will endeavor to make some arrangements for the care of the wires.

On motion of Ald. Saunders it was decided to ask the council to pass a bylaw giving the city engineer authority to hire men for the work of the department.

This is the outcome of the dispute regarding the appointment of men for the steam rollers.

It was decided to offer Mr. George McNeil, of Mount Pleasant avenue, \$150 for earth to fill in the ravine near his residence.

New Crossings.

City Engineer Graydon was instructed to purchase three cars of brick for crossings.

George Burdick & Sons were given the contract for repairs to the east end hall for \$254.

Those present were Ald. Tancock, Ald. Saunders, Ald. Morgan, Ald. Cock, City Engineer Graydon and Secretary S. Baker.

MURDERED THREE TO GET BRIDE HOME

Marshalltown, Iowa, June 9.—Developments of the last twelve hours have strengthened the professed belief of the sheriff's officers and County Attorney Egernayer that Raymond Hardy is guilty of the murder Sunday night of his father and mother, James Hardy and his wife, and his brother Earl, near Van Cleave. They assert that the crime was part of a plan to get money to enable Raymond to wed.

To the sheriff last night and to the county attorney this morning, young Hardy told conflicting stories about incidents of the day before the murder and the night the triple crime is supposed to have been committed. For three hours this morning the county attorney examined Hardy in his cell. The prisoner declared over and over again that he was innocent, but he changed minor points in the story on repeating it.

The sheriff claims to have proof that is all but positive that young Hardy's story of finding a saddled and bridled horse in the barn at his father's home Sunday morning is untrue. The saddle, he said, was on the horse that was found in the barn, but it was covered with dust, and evidently had not been touched recently.

The only motive those who accuse Hardy of the murders have considered is that he sought to become the sole heir to the live stock, machinery and other property on his parents' farm. The young man is said to have admitted that he had little money and no prospects of any more on his wedding day, which was to have been today. His accusers assert that if he is guilty of the crime was planned with a view to securing means to start housekeeping.

A note of sale for \$1,000, dated Nov. 1, 1909, and purporting to be given to Raymond Hardy by his father and brother Earl, was found today. Raymond admitted that it was a forgery. He said he had drawn and signed it "just for fun" and had no idea of ever using it.

BUCKET SHOP DECISION.

Philadelphia, June 9.—The six men arrested in this city on April 2, charged by the Government with conspiracy in connection with the operation of alleged bucket-shops in the district of Columbia, were ordered removed to Washington today, Judge McPherson, in the United States court deciding that the defendants can be taken to that city by the Federal authorities for trial. An appeal was immediately taken to the supreme court of the United States.

The defendants were arrested on warrants issued in the district of Columbia at the time the Washington authorities made a raid on all bucket-shops in Baltimore, Philadelphia, Jersey City, and New York.

The Government considers the decision of Judge McPherson an important one, and it may lead to further action in the crusade against all bucket-shops.

The court holds that it is lawful to try the defendants in Washington, although the alleged unlawful agreement may not have been entered into there.
