# BOARD OF CENSORS FOR PICTURE FILMS

New Regulations For Ontario Go Into Force This Week.

Force This Week.

Toronto, May 29.—Next Thursday the new provincial law regulating moving picture machines, and under which a board of censors passes on all films exhibited comes into force.

Under the new statute passed last session regulations have been drafted for the observance by every film exchange and every user, exhibitor and operator of a cinematograph, moving picture machine or other similar apparatus. Film exchanges are now licensed. For licenses issued in June the exchange must pay a fee of \$500, the exhibitor \$100 and the operator of the machine \$5. June is the first month in the license year, and licenses issued on dates in succeeding months are only good for the remainder of the year, and the fees are graded in proportion. Thus in May the film exchange fee is \$42 for the exhibitor and for the operator it is \$2 50.

Operators' licenses shall not be assignable and film exchange and users' or exhibitors' licenses shall only be assignable are of the Provincial Treasurer or assistant treasurer indorsed on such licenses.
