### FORGET CORNERED BY MR. LEMIEUX

Half Hour Over the Richelieu Fight.

EXPLANATION IS WEAK

Says He Did Not Go Into Campaign as Agent For Hon, Robert Rogers.

Ottawa, Dec. 3.—Sir Rodolphe Forget attempted to defend his own and Hon. Robert Rogers' acts in connection with the Richelieu by-election campaign, but did not make a very good job of it.

Sir Rodolphe "explained" that he had been sent into Richelieu by the Government, but had gone as personal matter, being under personal obligations for political aid in the past to Mr. Morgan, the Conservative can-didate. He branded as untrue the report of his speech in La Patrie, which represented him as saying that he was authorized by Hon. Mr. Rogers to promise the construction of a marine railway at Sorel in the event of Mr. Morgan being returned, and in this connection denied that he owned La Patrie newspaper, or had any interest n the property.

Monk's Old Pledge. Sir Rodolphe explained that months before the by-election was on, Hon. F. D. Monk, then minister of public vorks, at a social banquet, had promised the people of Sorel that this marine railway would be constructed by the Government. Naturally, when the writs were out for the by-election and Mr. Monk resigned, Sir Rodolphe was asked whether the new minister of public works would carry out the pledges of his predecessor.

"Now, the night I spoke at Sore during the election," proceeded Si Rodolphe, "I heard that Mr. Monk had resigned, and that it was rumored that Mr. Rogers would take his place as Minister of Public Works. What I said at Sorel was: 'I have just heard that Mr. Monk has resigned his portfolio, but you may be sure that whether his successor is Mr. Rogers or anybody else he will carry out the promise made by his predecessor,' I added: 'It will be more sure if you elect my friend, Mr. Morgan." (Liberal jeers and "Oh, oh's.")
Proceeding, Sir Rodolphe said that he saw by Hansard that Hon, Mr. Lemieux had stated in the House that he heard the promise made. "I ask him now if he can make the state-

ment that he was present," declared Sir Rodolphe Mr. Lemieux Replies. Hon. Mr. Lemieux rose at once. "I was present at Sorel when the honorable gentleman spoke on the eve of the election, and I heard him make the promise contained in the speech of the leader of the Opposition.
