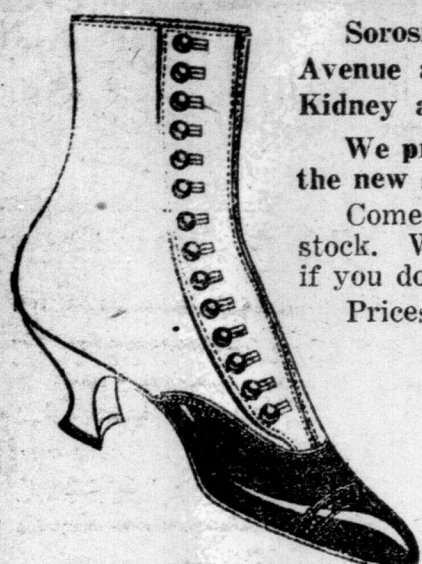

## FIGHT THE MOTHS BEFORE THEIR DEADLY WORK IS DONE

Now Is the Time to Destroy Eggs—Air and Sun Fine Remedies—Newspaper for Wrappings

The time to begin to guard against moths is before the moths get to work and that means before warm weather begins. For once moths have chosen a garment as their nesting place, the fight against them is almost hopeless.

However, if moths have begun to work, don't be discouraged. Air and sun the garments in which their traces have been found. Brush out any eggs you may find. Kill all the moths in sight. The sponge the garment thoroughly with soap and water, or else with clear water. Air it for two or three days, bringing it in the house at night. Then pack it away separately from garments in which no trace of moths has been found.

Really the best thing to do to a garment in which the moths have begun to work is not to pack it in a trunk or box, but hang it in a light room. Moths work little in the light. Therefore if it is possible to hang a garment where it can be frequently moved about, in the light, there is a good chance that it will escape further devastation at the hands of the moths.

Moth balls, camphor, cedar and other remedies do little good after the moths have once begun their work. If a garment free from moths is packed securely away in camphor, where no moths can reach it, the moths won't harm it. That is about the truth of the matter. Of course

they dislike camphor and other moth preventives and probably will not go near garments steeped in these preventives. But if they have already laid their eggs, the eggs will hatch. And if the moths are in a garment that is packed away in camphor balls, little as the moths like the camphor, they will probably stay where they are.

Air and Sunshine. Both are helpful in making clothes moth proof. Air everything in the sun that you wish to back away for the summer. Then brush everything and make sure that no spots or dust remain. Moths gather where there is dirt.

The rooms where clothes are stored should be thoroughly aired and, if possible, sunned. The woodwork should be washed with soap and water to which ammonia has been added. The inside of closets or drawers in which garments are packed should also be washed thoroughly with ammonia water.

Camphor balls that are put in carpets or rugs should be ground up and rubbed into the carpet to do the most good.

After everything is prepared, wrap all garments or hangings or carpets in newspaper. Glue or paste the edges together. Then use more newspaper wrappings, gluing the edges of these securely. For the whole secret of success lies in making the paper wrappings airtight—therefore moth-tight.

## HOW TO PREPARE SPINACH

BY CAROLINE COE.

Spinach should be one of the most healthful, but there is no other vegetable more abused or ruined in the cooking. It is rich in mineral matter and potash salts, and by the ordinary way of cooking these are almost entirely lost. It is also a laxative, although it does not supply much nutriment.

Wash spinach many times in clear, cold water. Be sure it is perfectly free from sand and dust. Put into sauce pan, with tight cover. Do not put in a drop of water. Cover closely and cook about fifteen minutes. The juice will run out and it will cook in that. Stir up once or twice. When done drain, chop fine and season with butter, salt and pepper. Serve with either hard-boiled eggs or cream sauce.

Spinach Patties.  
Boil spinach as in recipe given above. Drain and chop fine. Allow to drain dry. Put a tablespoon of butter into sauce pan. When hot but not brown add two even tablespoons of flour. When smooth add chopped spinach. Salt and pepper to taste. Cook slowly five minutes. Butter muffin or patty pans, press the spinach mixture firmly into these. Set in oven for ten minutes. Do not bake—just keep them hot. Turn out on platter and cover with rich white sauce. Slice the whites of hard-boiled eggs, place on top of each patty. Rice the yolks over top and send to table hot.
