

## MAYOR P. J. HENRY OF RIDGETOWN GETS SIXTH ACCLAMATION

## ELECTION RESULTS

### Mayor Johnson Re-elected in St. Thomas—Some Sur- prises Are Sprung.

ST. THOMAS, Jan. 4.—Mr. B. Johnson was re-elected as mayor of St. Thomas today over ex-Ald. Gilbert Roche and ex-Ald. A. E. Hookway. The vote stood: Johnson, 1,017; Roche, 759; Hookway, 358. Majority for Johnson, 218.

There are four new faces on the city council—John R. Martin, J. W. Chantler, L. S. Poole and L. Pearson. Roche and Hookway, of last year's council, contested the mayoralty, and ex-Ald. Morris and Thompson went down in the fight.

A big surprise. The defeat of the latter was the big surprise of the voting. The alderman elected as follows: F. Brinkman, J. W. Chantler, C. A. Hammond, B. A. Horton, W. R. Jackson, P. Mehan, J. R. Martin, T. S. Poole, L. Pearson, Wm. Trout, J. W. Webster.

"Pat" Mehan is the oldest member of the council, this being his 33rd year. During this long period of service he served two terms as mayor.

Colin A. Hammond had the distinction of heading the poll, with the magnificent vote of 1,262. Mr. Hammond served his first year on the council in 1914, and this grand endorsement of the citizens is a gracious tribute to his municipal qualities.

John R. Martin, one of the newly elected, was for years on the council, but retired at the end of 1913. T. S. Poole, another new member, also served a year as a member of the council in 1912.

Two newcomers, Lorne Pearson and Jack Chantler, are only two aldermen elected who are entire strangers. The former is a well-known contractor, and Mr. Chantler, formerly a coal dealer, is secretary of the St. Thomas Baseball Club in which concern is a large block of stock. Mr. Chantler is also the youngest member, being only 24 years of age.

Geo. Crocker was re-elected over Dr. P. Guest for water commissioner. School trustees.

There was a hot fight for school trustees the following being successful: L. M. Miller, G. A. Anderson, Dr. E. W. Honsinger, Fred W. White, A. E. McDonald.

## BRITISH RESPONSE EXPECTED IN WEEK

### Outline Is Submitted For Examination To France. HOLLAND HAS A PLAN Organizes a Trust Company Which Will Handle Imports.

LONDON, Jan. 4.—7:45 p.m.—The British Government's reply to the American note concerning contraband, probably will be sent before the end of this week. An outline of the reply has been submitted to France, which is greatly interested because of activity of French ships in the Mediterranean.

Probably there will be a statement issued shortly, showing that Italy and England, and the other allies, have arrived at an understanding concerning contraband, satisfactory to all the belligerents.

It can be authoritatively stated that only five cargoes, destined for Italy, have been stopped at Gibraltar since November 15. Two of these were released within three days and the others as soon as the alleged contraband in their cargoes could be removed. Since December 4, no cargoes destined for Italy have been intercepted by the Allies.

Rubber cargoes held in English ports, destined for American arms, probably will be released shortly for shipment to Great Britain, which needs much rubber for the manufacture of the tires.

Continued negotiations are in progress between the Allies and the neutral European countries, situated near Germany, looking toward the signing of export regulations, which will prevent American shipments from reaching Germany and Austria through neighboring countries other than Italy. A loosening of the regulations applying to American cargoes, it is said by British officials, will depend largely on the assurances given by the neutrals that they will not assist in supplying Germany, Austria and Turkey with munitions of war.

Little French Comment.  
PARIS, Jan. 4.—5:05 p.m.—The comment of the French newspapers on the note of the United States to Great Britain concerning delays to commerce through the search of vessels by British warships, the lowering of the journals representing the official point of view, is not very favorable.

Mr. J. A. J. under-secretary of the ministry of commerce, in an article in La France which, while recognizing what he calls the bad humor of American exporters, develops his view that American interests lie in allowing Great Britain to carry out her work of policing the seas tranquilly for the salvation of Europe at the world.

Netherlands Plan.  
THE HAGUE (via London), Jan. 4.—10:20 p.m.—The Netherlands Overseas Trust Company, which was organized for the purpose of taking from the Government the responsibility for consigning shipments, will have a meeting tomorrow and at its conclusion an announcement concerning the business policy of the company will be made.

Company purposes to handle all imports to Holland. It is understood it is persona grata with the British Government, and that it was organized with the object of putting imports on a firm commercial basis.

WILL MAINTAIN FRIENDLY TONE.  
WASHINGTON, D.C., Jan. 4.—Sir Cecil Spring-Rice, the British ambassador, called at the state department today for the first time since the American note of protest on shipping was sent to Great Britain. He conferred with Counselor Robert Lansing.

Though he had received no instructions as yet concerning the answer which is to be made to the American note, the British ambassador indicated that it would be of a most friendly character.

It is understood that Sir Cecil regards the American note as moderate in tone compared to the usual uncompromising and mandatory tenor of the notes between neutrals and belligerents in times of war.

That Sir Edward Grey in his talks with Ambassador Page similarly showed that England received the American note in a most amicable spirit and intended to ameliorate the shipping so far as was possible to do so, was learned today from high officials here.

Will Certify Cargoes.  
Another development, which is regarded as affording satisfaction on one of the points under dispute between Great Britain and the United States, is the decision of the Washington administration to certify American cargoes as to their exact contents before leaving American ports. Secretaries Bryan and Redfield and Acting Secretary Peters, of the treasury department, conferred today on the formulation of a circular to be issued tomorrow urging co-operation between American exporters, shippers and the Government in this regard.
