Molybdenite-Molybdenum Sulphide. To the Editor of The Advertiser: We learn that Great Britain is calling for "steel hardeners" to be used in the preparation of her war armaments. Molybdenite is one of the chief metals used for this purpose, and perhaps better than any other, except nickel. But for several years past tungsten has been imported to England in large quantities from Germany as a ubstitute. Now new fields must be explored for these rare metals, so desirable at the present moment. It can be shown that in various parts

of Northern Ontario traces of molybdenite have been discovered, but so far in the history of mining no large quantities have been produced. The Government has advised miner to familiarize themselves with good descriptions of this metal, as likely to occur in a variety of rocks commo our country, such as gneiss, granite, muca schist and granular limestone, samples of which are in my private collection of minerals in London, Ont. It resembles graphite (lead), slightly paler in color, and when heated gives off fumes of sulphur, and is soluble in nitric acid. These are the tests to be used in detecting this metal, and may

be of profit to miners or prospector

who may have the desire to look for a

metal that is now almost as valuable

as gold. The samples shown to the
