JUDGE MAY ORDER PAYMENT OF BILL

May Make Order Upon City's
Bankers For Amount
of Claim.

At a meeting of the utilities board
yesterday afternoon a communication
from the city solicitor, stating that judg-
ment had been given in favor of H. J.
Glaubits, for the salary he was suing
for and costs, was turned over to Mayor
Stevenson. The letter was sent to the
board of the board of control, and
after the meeting was over the mayor
took it down to the city solicitor. It is
expected now that the judge will order
the Bank of Montreal to pay the claim.

Contracts for the new turbines and

not awarded pending a letter from En-

A request from citizens in the vicinity
of Hamilton road and Rectory street for
a pay station for their water and elec-

matter of the parks board going ahead
and making expenditures for work with-
out bringing it to the notice of the com-
missioners. Commissioner McFarland
said he thought that when estimates
were passed his committee could ex-
pend the money. It was pointed out that
the parks committee is merely an ad-
visory board. In future all matters will
be brought to the main board for sanc-
tion.

FORMER LONDON "VET." DIES IN VASSAR, MICH.

Dr. Jesse B. Cornell, Who Left Forest
City in 1889, Victim of Blood
Poisoning.

VASSAR, Mich., June 17.—The death
occurred here this afternoon of Dr.
Jesse B. Cornell, formerly a student of
London, Ont. Dr. Cornell, who was a
veterinarian, came to Michigan in 1888
from the Canadian city and settled in
Vassar, in which he built up a lucrative
practice. He was 60 years old.

Death was caused by blood poisoning,
the disease being contracted several
weeks ago.

SYNOD OF HURON CLOSES SESSIONS

Annual Gathering Successful- ly Concluded at St. Paul's Cathedral.

COMMITTEES ARE NAMED

Representatives to Provincial
and General Synods Are
Elected.

The annual session of the Synod of
Huron, which concluded yesterday, will
be remembered as one of the most har-
monious in the history of the diocese.
Not a single serious difference of opin-
ion arose to mar the perfect friendli-
ness of the deliberations of the dele-
gates, although lengthy discussions
followed the submission of one or two
recommendations, these were merely
in the nature of discussion of knotty
questions of technique.

To a very large extent this happy
result must be credited to the perfect
fact and mastery grasp of all the busi-
ness of the diocese of His Lordship
Bishop Williams, whose efficiency as
chairman of the meeting was made the
subject of a eulogistic address by Canon
Norman L. Tucker, rector of St. Paul's
Cathedral, in the closing hour of the
session.

His Lordship, Canon Tucker said, put
into effect the program of the synod
those principles of autonomy for which
he was a well-known advocate. His
fame as a chairman extended a long
way beyond the bounds of the diocese
of Huron.

The bishop, in reply, thanked the
delegates for the applause with which
they had greeted Canon Tucker's re-
marks, and which testified to the good-
will they bore towards himself. He ad-
mitted with a smile that no work ap-
pealed to him as much as did that
of "presiding." He always tried to
live up to his belief in the principle
of self-government and did not im-
pose on the delegates anything except
when he thought it was in danger of
going astray (this again with a smile,
which was reflected on the faces of
the delegates).

His Lordship's last act before ad-
journment was the appointment of Rev.
James Ardill of St. George's, Owen
Sound, to succeed the late Canon
Downie as a canon, of Rev. Charles
Mills, rural dean of Elgin, to be in-
spectors of Sunday Schools in the
diocese, and of Rev. W. P. Brownlee to
take the place of Mr. Mills as rural
dean of Elgin. The bishop expressed
deep regret that Mr. Ardill had been
prevented by illness from attend-
ing the session and accepting his ap-
pointment in person.

As each annual session of the synod
concludes some of the faces are mis-
sed and some new ones are seen. For
many years, this year among them, one
of the most interesting figures at the
meetings has been Dr. Thomas Brad-
ley of Berrie, who was a delegate as far
back as 1883. Not a single one of the
delegate who sat with him in the
year is now living so far as he knows,
and certainly not one of them has
continued to attend synod meetings
until the present year.
