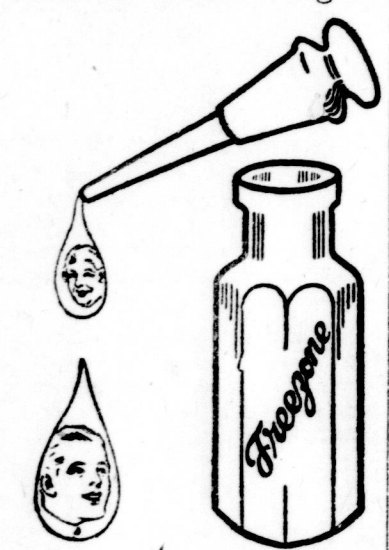

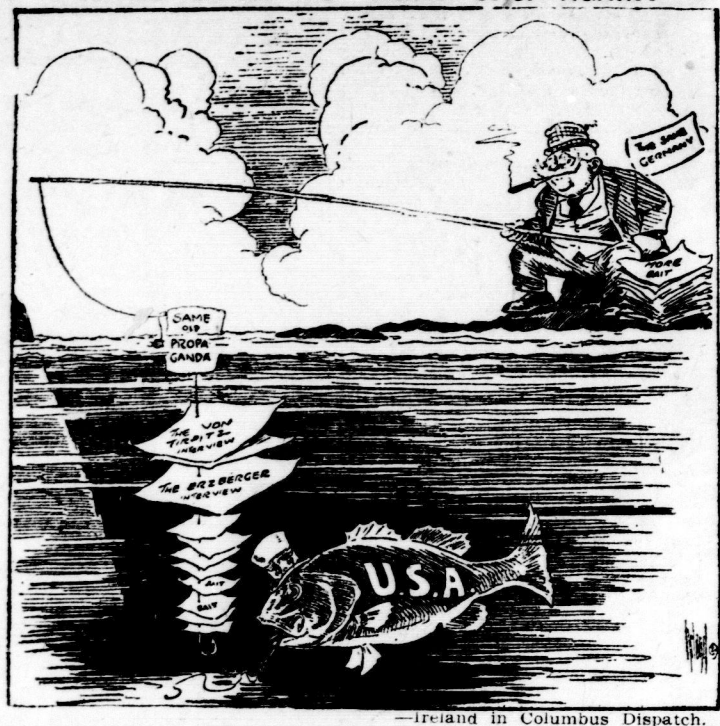

Future Transmissions To Be Electrical?

Conventional Gear Set Has Been, Probably, the Least Improved of Any of the Motor Vehicle's Main Units—Various Ways in Which Electricity Is Utilized in Motor Cars For Power Transmission, and Some of the Manifold Possibilities Told in Non-Technical Language.

LONDON, May 10.—There are many ways in which electrical machinery can be introduced into the transmission of a motor car, with a view primarily to eliminating the ordinary type of change-speed gear, and providing what corresponds to an infinite variety of gear ratios. The main advantages claimed for what has come to be known as gasoline-electric transmission are smoothness of running, and retardation, eliminating sudden shock, ability to employ big power at very low speed, and superiority in the matter of tire wear due to the steadiness of motion. On the other hand, the arguments against such systems are chiefly based on their liability to increase the weight of the car mechanism and to the introduction of electrical losses which may lead to an increase in gasoline consumption. The main features of the different systems of employing electricity in the transmission are as follows: First is the most obvious system of all, but by no means the most satisfactory in practice. Mounted on the engine shaft is the armature of a dynamo, the field magnets of which are rigidly connected to the commutator of the dynamo. The commutator of the dynamo is connected to the positive and negative terminals of a battery of accumulators. This battery acts as a sort of reservoir of power. The engine, and consequently the dynamo, runs at a constant speed, producing in the windings of the latter a voltage suitable to charge the accumulators at a proper rate.

In or near the axle of the driving wheels are the armatures of two electric motors, the field magnets of which are again rigidly secured to the car frame. From the accumulators electric connections lead to the brushes of each of these two motors, which drive the two wheels independently. In general theory, this system is very near perfection, since it provides for constant engine speed in conjunction with a big variety of road speeds. Under such circumstances it ought to be possible to use coal oil or some other cheap fuel instead of gasoline. While ascending hills the battery would be tending to discharge. In other words, it would be discharging more rapidly than it is being recharged. At fairly full speed, and on the level, the charging and discharging rates might be about equal. At low speeds on the level, and when descending gradients, charging would be more rapid than discharging. In practice there are almost insuperable drawbacks to the introduction of a battery of accumulators in this way. The presence makes the whole system very heavy. It is really much as if we took a fully-equipped electric vehicle and added to it a petrol motor and a dynamo to keep its battery charged. Even without these, the petrol engine and the battery are heavy as compared with the gasoline car. An obvious modification of the battery system would be obtained by introducing a battery between the two electric motors in other words, by using one electric motor and a differential gear instead of two electrical motors. Yet other modifications are possible according to the exact way in which the battery is employed, but in no case up to the present has any system involving a battery which is truly an essential feature in the propelling mechanism ever made good in practice on a gasoline vehicle. In the simplest possible system of plain electric transmission without the assistance of a battery, the gasoline engine propels the armatures of a dynamo, the field magnets of which are secured to the car frame. The current generated by the dynamo is taken to the brushes of an electric motor similarly arranged, the field magnets of which are connected through differential gearing to the axle. There is no mechanical connection whatever between the engine and the driving wheels, so that

TRAP GUN FILLED LIQUOR THIEVES FULL OF BUCKSHOT

Raid On Film Magnate's Private Stock Ended Fatally For One Bootlegger.

NEW YORK, May 10.—A trap gun, loaded with buckshot, fastened in the cellar of the home of Adolph Zukor, president of the Famous Players Lasky Corporation, in the hills back of Nyack, to protect his private stock of liquor, was discharged when two bootleggers attempted to open the cellar door late Sunday night, and one of them was wounded so severely that he died after running a short distance. The other was wounded, but got away. The body of the man found crumpled up in a plowed field about two hundred yards from the house has been identified as that of Edward Cotes, 50, of Haverstraw, who, on June 25, 1918, was sentenced to serve a year in the penitentiary for grand larceny, and who later served another six months in jail for some other offense. Recently he has been suspected of bootlegging, and Under-Sheriff Woods says he has heard that only a short time ago Cotes supplied a Haverstraw saloonkeeper with eleven cases of whiskey.

Zukor's home is one of the largest in that part of the country. It consists of two main houses, one called "The Day House," in which is a large living room, dining room, kitchen and den, and "The Night House," a larger building, divided mostly into sleeping apartments. They are of rough stone, bungalow type, and are connected by a pergola. There are two large natural swimming pools connected with the houses and another artificial swimming pool in process of construction. On other parts of the 800-acre estate are a garage, over which sleeps the caretaker, Patrick K. Murphy, and his family, a barn and outbuildings for the 40 men and their families who work on the place. In the day house are a number of valuable antiques and many valuable paintings, as well as a safe which contains valuables. Mr. Zukor is in Europe and not expected to return before May 17, and Murphy has been unusually vigilant in guarding the many valuable articles left in his care. About ten days ago, however, two men broke into the day house, and succeeded in getting away with articles valued at \$500, although they were detected by the watchman, Richard Halloran, who fired several shots at them. Murphy decided to make a part of the place burglarproof after this attempt. There is a bar of solid mahogany in the living room of the day house, and although nobody on the place would say anything about it today, Mr. Zukor is believed to have a large and valuable stock of liquor in his cellar, moved there before prohibition became effective. Murphy was apprehensive about the liquor, and built a trap for anyone who might be after it.

AUTOIST COMMITTED ON MANSLAUGHTER CHARGE AT KITCHENER

Albert Martin Is Allowed Bail Till Fall Assizes.

KITCHENER, May 10.—Albert Martin, charged with manslaughter in connection with the death of Stanley Kramer who was knocked from his bicycle here on April 12, a motor car, received his preliminary hearing before Magistrate Wainwright in the police court and was committed for trial at the fall assizes. He was allowed out on bail by Judge Hearn, the amount being \$2,000 cash.

It has been announced by President Breithaupt of the Waterloo-Wellington Railway that the new rates of eight cents cash fare with a minimum of six cents for tickets will be started tomorrow. The road is putting this schedule into force with the approval of the majority of patrons of the road. Mr. Breithaupt claims the railway will allow this schedule inasmuch as the distance covered is more than three miles.

HYDRO REDUCTIONS TO BE MADE SOON

Power Commission Advises Sarnia Regarding the Proposed Plans.

SARNIA, May 10.—That the question of the reduction of rates to be charged for hydro power this year is now before the Ontario commission, and that the recommendation as to the rate, if any, to be made in Sarnia will be made soon, was the substance of the information in a letter from the provincial body, read at the meeting of the local commission today. The communication pointed out that the reduction in rates to power users last year was made because analysis of the year's operation showed the largest part of the surplus came from power customers. The Ontario commission also advised that monthly power bills may be charged against the surplus fund to the credit of the Sarnia hydro power provincial body until such surplus is wiped out. To be prepared for any emergency or emergency, a query asking if such method could be adopted was recently forwarded to Toronto, and the foregoing was the gist of the reply.

SARNIA RATEPAYERS TO VOTE ON BYLAW

\$95,000 May Be Expended On Waterworks Improvements.

SARNIA, May 10.—The city council at its meeting this afternoon set June 6 as the date on which Sarnia ratepayers will vote on a bylaw to raise \$95,000 for waterworks purposes, including the removal of the large pump from the George street plant to Point Edward and to procure and pay for new mains for certain streets. The council also appointed Willard Simpson, city auditor and service officer at a salary of \$2,000 per year, and adopted a bylaw granting gratuities to the two retiring officials, James D. Stewart, city clerk, and Dr. James Woods, former city treasurer. The gratuity of the former was fixed at \$900 per annum for life, and the latter at \$440 a year for life. Mr. Stewart had been town and then city clerk for 33 years, and Dr. Woods, city treasurer for 20 years. Their superannuation was based on forty per cent of their average salary for the last ten years. SEEDS DISTRIBUTED FOR SCHOOL GARDENS

SIMCOE, May 10.—Distribution of 806 packages of seeds to the 102 rural schools of Norfolk County has been completed by E. F. Neft, county representative of the provincial department of agriculture. The gardens are to be planted and cared for only by the pupils of the schools. The last week in August the

products of the pupils' gardens will be judged by local judges, appointed in each township. The products of seeds distributed in Townsend, Windham, Middleton and North Walsingham Townships will be exhibited at the local fall fairs, while the children's products in Houghton, Charlotteville, Woodhouse and South Walsingham Townships will be exhibited at the school fairs organized at each school for the purpose. The seeds were distributed in the following proportions: 90 packages of oats, 40 packages of barley, 258 packages of Irish Cobblers, 257 packages of Dooley brand potatoes, 99 packages of mangels and 82 packages of turnip seeds. This is the greatest amount of seeds ever distributed to school children by the Government in Norfolk County.

GOMPERS' WARNING. Cincinnati, May 10.—"The greedy hordes of employers in the United States had better watch out," President Samuel Gompers of the American Federation of Labor warned in a address here last night at a labor mass meeting. "I most earnestly desire to impress," he said, "on those who have undertaken to destroy the labor movement—don't put manhood and womanhood to too severe a test. You seem to have the upper hand now, but remember, the pendulum doesn't always swing one way. I respectfully suggest thoughtful consideration of the wisdom of driving your bargain too hard."
