Well-Known New York Critic Says Canadians Lovers of Good Music

DO the Canadians love music? Of course, they do, says Mr. S. L. Debalta, New York musical critic, here for De Feo Grand Opera Company.

Mr. S. L. Debalta, a contributor to Musical America, the New York Times and other publications, is in London since last night in the interests of the De Feo Grand Opera Company, which is to give a short season of grand opera next week at the Grand Opera House, beginning Wednesday, Oct. 18.

Mr. Debalta was found at the Teumseh House busy preparing his campaign to win the support of the local music lovers for the coming season of grand opera.

"Before I landed in Canada," said Mr. Debalta, "I was told that your country was not musical; that this divine art had no chapel nor worshippers here, at least very few. I came here for the first time two months ago on a mission for a syndicate of French and American newspapers to study the country from a political, economic and intellectual angle. Thanks to the courtesy of Mr. J. M. Gibson, the president of the Society of Canadian Authors, and at the same time director of publicity of the Canadian Pacific, who was emulated in his kindness by Mr. Whiteside, the literary agent of the Canadian National Railways, the freedom of the country was granted to me, and I crossed it from south to north and from east to west.

"That I have seen and heard amazed me. In my mind—the forcibly limited mind of a globe-trotting journalist—Canada, with a larger population, is destined to take its place among the leading countries of the world; you already possess the solid foundation of a sturdy constitution; the arteries formed by your wonderful railroad system, like the blood arteries in a healthy human body, give ample proof of a wonderful vitality.

"Owing to my natural leanings, I was quite interested in finding out how far you have progressed in the domain of art, in music especially. The management of the Canadian National Exhibition honored me by inviting me as a special guest to Music Day. I learned there in less than 24 hours more about musical Canada than I could have done otherwise in the month of the beaver was as strong as in America or elsewhere; but due to a reduced population, smaller means and longer distances between cities, the development is naturally not quite as advanced here.

"It was at the National Exhibition that I came across De Feo and his opera company. I have known Mr. De Feo for many years as the most courageous and one of the cleverest opera impresarios of the day. The tremendous success of his company at the exhibition did not surprise me; the Toronto papers were right in proclaiming it 'the sensation of the Canadian National Exhibition.'

"I always thought that opera should not remain a luxury for the few who can afford the high prices that are usually exacted for it. The nightly attendances of 7,000 and 8,000 at the Coliseum convinced me that the masses wanted opera. Mr. De Feo thought so, too, and thus we decided to embark on this Canadian venture with the highly artistic intention to give everybody in this country a taste of lyric drama.

"With a company composed of artists from the Metropolitan Opera House of New York, the Covent Garden of London and the Grand Opera of Paris, the De Feo Grand Opera Company is touring this country and what is almost incredible—gives grand opera of the highest quality at prices usually charged for traveling dramatic and musical comedy shows. And, mind you, we carry 90 people, three carloads of brand new scenery and costumes, an orchestra of our own, and we give a performance at two dollars and a dollar and a half an orchestra seat."

"How is it possible? Well, I really do not know. It would hardly be possible, I am sure, if it were purely a commercial enterprise, with material gain as the sole object in view. But this is not the case; I want to be believed when I say that behind this gigantic enterprise there is an ideal, the noble aim of educating the masses and encouraging the development of music in this country."

"We want and we bid for everybody's patronage; we have made the prices so low as to give nobody an excuse to stay away; and if we succeed in covering our expenses—the trifling of over \$20,000 a week—we will be satisfied and compensated for our missionary work. We hope for the gratitude of the people in every city, large or small, we have visited. There is no reason why Canada should not be on the same footing as other countries when it comes to entertainments of a higher character."

STANDARDIZE UNIFORMS OF PROVINCIAL POLICE

TORONTO, Oct. 12.—No longer will different sections of the provincial police be known by the variety of their uniforms rather than by their similarity. General Victor Williams has just chosen a standard uniform which has been approved by Attorney-General Raney and will shortly be issued to all the men on the force.

There is a slight leaning toward the mounted type. Constables and sergeants will in future wear blue serge uniforms, broad Stetson hats and black Sam Browne belts with revolver holsters. Staff inspectors will wear three gold stars on the shoulder, provincial inspectors two, and district inspectors one. Inspectors will wear brown Sam Browne belts instead of black.
