Grosse Pt. Girls, Detroit, Are Thistles' Opponents

Game Expected To Break All Attendance Records For Ontario Girls Basketball In London—Thistles Are Elated.

Arrangements were made late last night to bring the Grosse Pointe Athletic Club girls' basketball five here Friday night to meet Thistles, in aid of the United Welfare Fund at the armistice. Bare expenses of the Detroit team will be taken out and with the record crowd attracted by this match the Welfare Fund total should show a big increase.

The Grosse Pointe girls, winners of the Michigan State title last year, are expected to arrive in London for this game with the title safely tucked away. This means that as any girls' point team are just as fast as any girls' team ever seen in action in London, and Thistles as among the best girls' teams playing basketball in the city.

More familiarly known as "Cap," Stevens, who used to run affairs athletic around Western University and was also a member of the Grosse Pointe team, together with the L. A. A. committee in London, are expected to be in the city for the match, and the Doc says these girls as far as basketball goes, are just as exclusive as the suburbs of the city.

FAVORS BUILDING WINDSOR DOCKS TO IMPROVE FERRY

Special Committee To Advise Council To Allow Work To Proceed.

WILL COST \$400,000

Company To Construct Another Boat When Conditions Warrant.

Windsor, April 18.—Agreeing to terms offered by President Walter Campbell of the Detroit and Windsor Ferry Company, at a conference in the city hall yesterday afternoon, the special committee of the city council will recommend to the council settlement of differences over which the company and the city have been split for several years.

Anxious to improve service, President Campbell in emphatic language made it plain to the committee that his company is anxious to improve the Windsor service. Plans for new docks at Ferry street and Onelette avenue will involve an expenditure of \$400,000. The dock at Ferry street will be started in 60 days if Dominion Government grants company a new franchise.

The company will also guarantee to continue the rate of six tickets for 25 cents for two years, and complete both docks within two years. The demand of the city for an all night ferry service was not conceded by the ferry company's president, who said that when conditions warranted such service a boat of the smaller type will operate on a 30-minute schedule.

Will Extend Docks.
The new docks planned by the company, and which will be proved by the Canadian marine and fisheries department, will be extended out to the harbor line, or 40 feet further into the river, and will accommodate automobiles and passengers moving from one dock to another.

Mayor Wilson, who favors the terms of settlement, said that when the council approves the committee's recommendation a delegation of aldermen will ask the government to allow the work to proceed.

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French Ridicule Plan Laid Down By Von Rosenberg

Sincerity of German Foreign Minister Is Questioned By Paris Officials—Twenty Billion Mark Offer From Industrialists.

Paris, April 17.—The German foreign minister, Herr Von Rosenberg, was virtually ridiculed in Paris yesterday.

If the French were disposed to listen to a proposition emanating from the reichstag their ears were closed by the attempts of Germans to wreck French and Belgian trains carrying cabinet ministers into the Ruhr. This little act of friendship occurred at the same time the German foreign minister was preaching "German moderation" and holding out his hands for American intervention and American loans, based probably on a thirty billion gold mark settlement for the European war.

The French recall that the proposition of Germany still centers about the coffin in the streets of the city, and Herr Bergmann was supposed to have delivered to the Paris conference in January, which was cut short by the German split. It is recorded that Herr Bergmann never approached the allies with his offer, and according to foreign officials, he never withdrew it from his pocket.

Sorrowful Tale of Suffering Ends As Sarnia Newsie Is Laid To Rest

Sarnia, April 18.—The last of Joseph Futio, 14-year-old, brown eyed, dark complexioned Italian lad, who sold his papers on the streets of Sarnia, was seen yesterday afternoon when six little compatriots carried the coffin to the Roman Catholic cemetery and eight autos carried sympathizers from the south ward of the city who have missed the sight of the cheery lad as he tramped along in sunshine and rain, carrying bundles of newspapers which earned him little but hard work.

Joe's story has more of a pathos than of many an urchin who finds his way into the imagination of novelists. A short while ago Joe was found sleeping in a packing case behind a city store and with tears in his eyes told the magistrate he would rather sleep under the sky than under the roof of his home.

Many were the cold nights when Joe had been covering for his head, and he had been shot after the funeral there is little detail available of the actual occurrence, which is supposed to have been accidental. Joe's stoppage speaks no English and cannot say. The police officer at Beaverton wired that Joe was killed while examining a gun.

Today the priests of Our Lady of Mercy Church said mass for the soul of the little Italian lad and the indigent poor committee of the city paid the cost of the funeral.
