## UNDEFENDED SUIT SEES \$690 WON

County Judge Decides Action in Favor of F. H. Butler.

Judgment by default was given F. H. Butler yesterday afternoon by Judge Macbeth in Mr. Butler's action for \$690 against A. E. H. Ladd, Detroit. The action against R. J. Edwards and Wm. J. Mortimer, London, and W. G. Rounds, Woodstock, was dismissed. The judge reserved his decision as to costs.

According to plaintiff, he loaned the money to Mr. Ladd in March, 1921, and at various times received payments on interest. Later on Ladd, who owned the London Art Glass and Mirror works, took the other three defendants into partnership.

In giving judgment, his honor declared that there was no contract between the plaintiff and the defendants, Edwards, Mortimer and Rounds.

Ladd was not in court, nor was he represented by counsel. A. R. Douglas appeared for Mr. Butler, J. L. Hodgins for R. J. Edwards and W. G. Rounds, and F. E. Perrin for W. J. Mortimer.

## HEAT TAKES FIRST WOODSTOCK VICTIM

Mrs. J. L. Wright Dies Suddenly After Trip in Auto.

Woodstock, June 8.—Death came very suddenly to Mrs. J. L. Wright of this city at an early hour this morning. Mrs. Wright had been on a motor trip to Hamilton beach Sunday with her husband and family, and it is thought that the excessive heat and trip were too much for her, although she felt no ill effects when she returned. However an hour or so afterwards she collapsed and died almost immediately.

Mrs. Wright was born in Warwick township in 1882. Surviving are her husband, four daughters and two sons.

## SETTLEMENT REACHED WITH KARN CO. ESTATE

Trustee Agrees To Pay Taxes For Two Years and Power Bills.

Woodstock, June 8.—Final settlement of unpaid taxes, power and water bills owing the city of Woodstock on the property and factory of the defunct Karn Piano Company was made at the meeting of the city council tonight, when the city accepted the offer of the Karn estate trustee, F. J. Howson, to pay the full amount of its claim, \$2,880.74, exclusive of the 1922 taxes amounting to \$988.50, which are now uncollectable.

## TRAIN UPSETS, KILLING EIGHT TRACK LAYERS

Negro Workers and Trainman Crushed To Death by Overturning Freight.

Peru, Ind., June 8.—Eight negro tracklayers and one trainman were killed today, when a Chesapeake & Ohio freight train overturned while rounding a curve near Converse, Ind., 15 miles south of here. The negroes were buried beneath the wreck of the engine tender, and 15 coal cars. The tracklayers had stepped aside to permit the train to pass, and were caught as the cars overturned.
