Hamilton, Jan. 13.—For 56 minutes of Saturday night's N. H. L. fixture here Hamilton outplayed and outscored the fast Ottawa team 2-0. Then the bottom fell out of the Thompson machine, and in less time than it would take to tell it, Neighbor and Boucher tied up the count. This necessitated overtime and after 14 1/2 minutes of play, Broadbent bled the time for the leaders, giving them a 3 to 2 verdict.

Ottawa, noted for their clean play, did not take kindly to the fact that they were being outplayed, and not one member of the squad passed up an opportunity of using the body or stick to good effect.

It all happened so quickly that those who looked away from the ice for a few seconds will be unable to tell how it happened. Hamilton was sailing along two goals from victory, and four minutes of playing time left. Those who had loosened up their overcoats early in the game began to button them up. They felt certain the Senators would win, and Manager Thompson was of the same opinion. He pulled Burch, Reach and Proctor from the forward line and sent the Green brothers and Corbet Denenny to hold the fort. Sprague was given the task and victory was turned into defeat before one could realize just what had taken place.

Frank Neighbor, who turned in a remarkable game, was the first to bulge the time for Ottawa. Even then Hamilton did not give up as they still had one goal left, but 40 seconds later when George Boucher scored on a long one from outside the defence the cheers turned to groans. Then Manager Thompson rushed the regulars back into action, but it proved too late. Art Ross refereed.

CANADIENS LOSE 5-3.

Toronto, Jan. 13.—St. Patricks broke their losing streak, which had carried for four games, in the N.H.L. fixture here Saturday when they defeated Canadiens 5 to 3. By this victory the Toronto team takes second place in the Calder League and Hamilton and Canadiens are in the cellar.

Although the game at times was not productive of good hockey, there were flashes of stick-handling that satisfied even the most critical. "Red" Stuart's lone rushes were a feature, and although he received a nasty cut on the forehead from Sprague Cleghorn's stick early in the second period, finished the individual star of the game. Sprague was given a match foul, which had much to do with the defeat of the visitors.

While "Babe" Dye was too closely watched to use his quick passes with much effect, he played a clever checking game, and altogether showed up better than at any other time since he got back into the sport. Corbett's defence was stone-wall in its effect, and he used his body to good effect many times. Jackson, who substituted at left wing, gave a nice exhibition of stick-handling, and made some good work on the part of Vezina kept him off the scoring list. Roach, in goal for the Irish, stopped many wicked shots, but did not clear well at times.

URGES LENIENCY.

Toronto, Jan. 13.—Referee Lou Marsh, who handled the St. Patricks-Canadian game here Saturday, in his report to President Calder, suggests that the automatic suspension drawn by Cleghorn's stick early in the second period, be immediately raised. In the referee's opinion the hooking of Stuart by Cleghorn deserved more than a major penalty, and under the rules only a match foul was left. He states the full penalty for a match foul is rather severe for the offence.

NIAGARA FALLS PLAYERS ARE EXONERATED BY O.H.A.

Toronto, Jan. 13.—The complaint of the Grimsby hockey club against Eugene Fraser and Stephen Rice of the Niagara Falls team, alleging deliberate rough play in the game at Niagara Falls on Jan. 5, causing injury to J. Ritchie McVicar and Dr. W. J. Carson of Grimsby, was dealt with at a meeting of the sub-committee of the O. H. A. here on Saturday. President W. A. Fry was in the chair, with Sheriff J. P. Paxton, treasurer and acting secretary, W. W. Davidson, Toronto, and Allan Germain, Port Colborne, present.

The sub-committee, after hearing evidence from both clubs concerned and Referee Harold Mitchell, found the charge not proven that the injuries to the Grimsby players were received through deliberate attempts on the part of the Niagara Falls players.

HOPPE RETAINS BILLIARD TITLE, BEATING COCHRAN

RICKARD OFFERS WILLIS \$300,000

Negro Heavy's Manager Insists Upon Meeting Dempsey Before Firpo.

New York, Jan. 13.—Harry Willis, New Orleans negro heavyweight, has been made an offer of \$300,000 by Tex Rickard for fights next summer with Luis Angel Firpo and Jack Dempsey.

The promoter, in making this announcement, added that conferences through an intermediary with Willis and the negro's manager, Faddy Mullins, so far had failed to effect an agreement.

Willis, according to Rickard, declared his willingness to accept the offer, confident that he can dispose of Firpo and earn a match with the champion, for which he has been seeking two years in vain. Mullins, however, balked at any proposition calling for an elimination test, insisting that Willis is entitled to meet Dempsey without further preliminaries. Rickard's refusal to agree to this has produced a deadlock which, it is believed, may keep Willis in the background of the 1924 heavyweight program, as he was in 1922 and 1923.
