## NO RECIPROCITY.

The cry for reciprocity with the United States which the Toronto Globe is encouraging in Canada arose with business men of the Eastern States. And the politicians of that country, and some in this, are endeavoring to bring it about. The Canadian public is being told that the States bordering on the line yearn to meet us as brothers and arrange a give-and-take treaty, which would make both countries everlastingly prosperous. This is very fine on the surface. But their interests in Canada is the interest of keen business men and politicians, who would buy our raw materials and sell us manufactured goods. In short they desire to exploit Canada for their own benefit. The selfishness of American business men is illustrated by the movement made by the General Electric Co. of the U. S. to have legislation passed at Washington prohibiting the export of Canadian electric power to Detroit. This would kill Windsor's and other western Ontario towns' chances of being served by the Hydro-Electric Commission. It is a straw showing which way the wind blows. They may profess friendship for us. But it is pure selfishness for the occasion. In a recent issue, the New York American makes this bold avowal. In passing it may be noted that this is the yellow journal which forced the late President McKinley into the Spanish-American war. It says: "This country has grown great thru the industrial sweep of an untaxed and untrammelled commerce. There is no political wisdom or business sense in truncating this all-involving continental commerce at the Canadian frontier. It is time that the discovery be made at Washington and at Ottawa that the protective principle had been falsely applied in the building of the tariff trade-routes across the grand meridian trade-routes of North America. The political annexation of Canada may be delayed a little. But commercial annexation is overdue. Canadians would have nothing to gain socially, morally or financially through annexation by the United States. On the other hand everything to lose. But it is well to know the motive which lies behind their ostentatious passing of the chocolate box."

## FIELDING IS NOT WELL

Minister of Finance is Badly in Need of a Rest.

Paralysis of Left Side of Face Has Taken a Good Deal Out of Him—His Illness May Be Made an Excuse for Delaying Parliament for Some Months—Many Difficult Questions Are to Come Up.

Ottawa, Sept. 30.—It is stated, on what appears to be excellent authority, that Parliament will not meet in November, as was intended, and it may be months before it does meet. Mr. Fielding's illness may be made the excuse, but the real reason is that the Government dreads next session.

Disturbing questions, which will involve statesmanship of the highest order, are to be dealt with. There is the tariff, also the naval question, the elevators, and the multitude of promises made by the Premier on his western tour. No work has been done by the Cabinet yet, in the way of preparation for next session.

Hon. Mr. Fielding arrived in the city yesterday. The Minister of Finance seemed to be in a cheerful mood, but it was very evident that the paralysis of the left side of the face, which attacked him a few days ago, has taken a good deal out of him. His step lacked the brisk buoyancy that has always been one of his characteristics. His left eye was protected by a guard, which covered also a portion of his cheek, but his face was drawn, and he looked years older than when he left here for England last June.

It is stated that Mr. Fielding's condition is not serious. "The doctors' reports are very reassuring," is the statement made today. It is added that Mr. Fielding will have to take a complete rest.

Just how successful the Minister of Finance will be in overcoming the restless energy of his nature, may be forecasted by his failure to obey doctors' instructions already. In spite of his illness, he paid a visit to his office in the eastern block yesterday afternoon, and insisted upon looking into some matters of importance which have been awaiting his return. "He simply can't rest," was the remark of an official of the Department.

A despatch from Washington states that the U. S. Department of State, under the President's direction, has made preparations to act as soon as word is received from Ottawa indicating the intention of the Dominion Government concerning the proposed reciprocity negotiations. It is understood in Ottawa that any move towards negotiations may be delayed until the Minister of Finance has had that rest which has been considered necessary by his illness.

Fishing a Failure. St. John's, Nfld., Sept. 30.—Owing to the almost complete failure of the shore fishing, it is feared that the privateers of the Labrador fishermen will be particularly severe during the coming winter. The season's catch is believed to be the smallest in the history of the Labrador fisheries. It was estimated yesterday that the total fish export from Labrador will not reach 50,000 quintals, while last year, which was itself an exceptionally poor one, the fishermen's exports amounted to 100,000 quintals.

Must Improve Service. Chatham, Sept. 30.—Mr. Dixon of the Railway Commission was in the city yesterday in consultation with city and county officials in reference to the train service on the Pere Marquette, a result of which that company will be compelled to arrange their schedule to provide better accommodation, and the C.P.R. also may be asked to install gates at all of the city crossings, with watchmen to guard over them.

Preferred Altar to Jury Box. Ottawa, Sept. 30.—A novel case came up before Judge Champagne in the Ottawa Superior court yesterday, when a witness wrote that he could not attend because he was being married. In his letter he says he laid the case before his fiancée, but she only smiled and said: "I need you more than the judge does." The excuse of the witness was accepted, and he will not be made liable for contempt of court.

Montreal to Welcome T. P. Montreal, Sept. 30.—Preparations have been going on here for some time to fully welcome T. P. O'Connor, who will speak at the Monument National on Thursday evening, Oct. 6. Mayor Guerin will preside, if his worship gets back in time from New York, when he will attend the consecration of St. Patrick's Cathedral, and the Irish envoy will be introduced by C. J. Doherty, M.P. for St. Ann.

Acquitted on Shooting Charge. Toronto, Sept. 30.—Victor Castiglano, an Italian, was acquitted by the sessions jury of shooting with intent at Charlie Ross in a row in a house on Chandon avenue, in August. There had been a general fight following upon a much mixed love affair, in which Castiglano and another were rival suitors, and Ross an intending peace-maker.

Socialists Nominates Candidate. Albany, N. Y., Sept. 30.—The state ticket of the Socialist-Labor party was filed yesterday with the secretary of state yesterday. Frank E. Passano of Troy is the candidate for governor.

Rubens' Picture for America. Paris, Sept. 30.—A special from Brussels says that the picture, "Bath of Diana," by Rubens, has been bought by an American collector for \$250,000.
