Boat Capsizes Off Read Island and Joseph Labellous Lost.

Reports of Many Smallpox Cases in Seattle—Diphtheria in Richmond.

Vanouver, B. C., March 6.—(Steamer) Casiar arriving today with details of another driving accident.

Dave Whitmore, Wilber Connant, and Jos. Labellous, attempted to cross from Read Island to Harlot bay last Friday afternoon.

The weather was stormy, and the boat catching in a tide rip capsized. The boat was overturned, and twice Labellous was thrown from the boat and sank, and twice he was rescued, once by Connant and once by Whitmore.

Labellous lay in the sea, and with superhuman effort reached the shore, where he discovered the body that was no longer had life in it.
