This announcement was made this afternoon when Mrs. Dietz, accompanied by her three attorneys, called at the prison to visit her husband.

## INTERNATIONAL CLERICUS CLOSES

Much Interest Aroused by Very Rev. Dean Doull of Victoria—Bishop of Olympia at the Closing Service.

VANCOUVER, May 18.—The honors in the debate this morning's session of the International Clericus held in St. James' church went to the Very Rev. Dean Doull of Victoria, who spoke at the close of a paper read by Rev. Dr. King of Olympia on "The part of the Holy Spirit in modern church work."

The dean, who is regarded as one of the finest speakers in the Anglican church of the west, touched on some of the most vital questions in the church today. Dwellings on the highest criticism of the Bible, he reminded his hearers that although the church did not pretend to be infallible on matters of dates, she could have only one answer for those who asked if all the books of Holy Writ were inspired. She must be broadminded where criticism was concerned, as in her treatment of those who held different views.

Dealing with the great fact of the incarnation and of the divinity of Our Lord, the dean pointed out that it was not enough for men to believe that Christ had been a perfect man. Even the Unitarians believed that. Where the church's her tradition, must draw the line of demarcation, was between those who believed in Him as the Son of God and those who did not. He was inclined to discredit the popular belief that the prosperity of a church was to be measured by the number of its communicants. He believed that some of the best work was done by the churches with scanty congregations. Money was admitted to be the sinews of war, but the same it was not the most essential need of the church. He said the case of a huge orphanage in Bristol which was maintained by prayer alone, the founder having refused to accept any endowment.

The dean also deprecated the tendency in different parts of the world to use state power to help in the church. He declared himself an advocate of early confirmation, and, keeping in touch throughout with the subject, he prayed that the personal knowledge of the Holy Spirit would soon become a real force in the life of church people as the real presence in the Holy Eucharist was becoming in the service used by the church today.

The speaker, whose address made a deep impression on the crowded hall, was repeatedly interrupted by sympathetic applause.

The Very Rev. Dean Paget of Calgary and Rev. Dr. Shaylor of Olympia, also spoke.

The closing service of the Clericus was held at All Saints' church in the afternoon, when Right Rev. Bishop Kestor of Olympia was the preacher. He pointed out that the way to win over those who were not of their belief was by adopting a sympathetic attitude towards them.

**Favor Church Union.**  
KINGSTON, Ont., May 18.—The Kingston district Methodist church this afternoon passed a resolution favoring church union, only one member opposing.

**Crow's Nest Coal Trouble.**  
WINNIPEG, May 18.—Dr. C. W. Gordon chairman of the coal miners' troubles in the West, has returned here and is pessimistic regarding a speedy settlement. He says that the board could have patched up a temporary agreement, but that had been done before, and what was wanted was a settlement that would last for some years. The inquiry would be resumed in three days and continued until the men went back to work.

## SECURE CONTROL OF IMMIGRATION

Conservative Members from British Columbia Urge Government to Abandon Arrangement with Japan.

OTTAWA, May 18.—That Canada should abandon her efforts to develop a large trade with Japan and China, and the new treaty between Great Britain and Japan and restrict or prohibit Japanese immigration was the policy enunciated by Martin Burrell in the House of Commons tonight when Mr. Fielding moved the house in committee to consider resolutions extending for two years the existing trade agreement with Japan.

Mr. Burrell declared Oriental trade a chimera. During the last three years Canada exported less to Japan than during the preceding three years. It was expected that Canadian wheat would find a large market in Japan, but owing to the heavy tariff maintained by Japan, Canada exported wheat to that country during the past three years to the value of only \$23,000. Big lead alone showed an increase in the amount exported to Japan during the last year, taking it to the value of \$130,000. After pointing out that the exports of lumber to Japan were steadily decreasing, Mr. Burrell said that Mr. Hill had failed to capture the Japanese trade and that there was not much prospect of succeeding where he had failed. Neither did Mr. Burrell see much hope of Canada building up a merchant marine on the Pacific as Japan is now far ahead of us. It would not be of any commercial advantage for Canada to adhere to the new treaty, Mr. Burrell said in conclusion, but it should be done because we could keep out Oriental immigration and have the backing of the British navy.

Hon. Mr. Fielding, by way of reply, read a letter he addressed to the Japanese consul-general, setting forth the reasons of Canada's ministers for desiring to continue the present arrangement for two years, as stated in the parliamentary resolution. While admitting that the trade with the Orient had not developed as rapidly as expected, he said Canada did not desire to be worse off in regard to Japan than other nations, and for that reason it was proposed to continue in the favored national class. As to immigration, he pointed out that our arrangement with Japan was not by treaty, but by a Japanese government had faithfully lived up to its promise to restrict immigration to Canada, with the result that only 1200 Japanese had come in during the last three years. Therefore it was the duty of the government to maintain the present arrangement.

George H. Cowan, Vancouver, dissented to the question of emigration from Japan, and urged that under the arrangement entered into, the power to restrict immigration from Japan to Canada was in the hands entirely of the Japanese government. Canada had nothing to do with the matter, but the vice of the treaty was that it gave a preference to Japanese immigrants over the immigrants from every other country. The arrangement was over and above the immigration act. Under the act, the Japanese were restricted, but under the arrangement there was no restriction on immigrants from Japan. He declared there was no necessity for the making of a treaty at all at this time. Why not, he asked, exercise the power of a self-restriction and keep the restriction on the power of immigration in our own hands? The commercial side of this treaty had little or no value. It was a danger not only to British Columbia but to Canada as a whole and to the empire at large.

Messrs. Barnard and Gordon continued the argument on lines similar to their colleagues from British Columbia. They demanded the prohibition of Oriental immigration.

As Dalton left the restaurant, near the corner of Ninth street and Broadway, he was stopped by Detective Helms of the Oakland police force.

Dalton hesitated and Attorney Donohue stepped up to him and searched him, securing a roll of bills.

## MANY SHEEP BURNED

Fire in Kansas City Stockyards Destroys a Thousand Animals—Confined in Pen.

KANSAS CITY, May 18.—Fire, which for an hour this afternoon endangered the entire Kansas City stockyards and the Live Stock Exchange building, destroyed sheep pens covering a square block, burned sheep estimated to the number of 1,000 and partly destroyed two miles of pens.

The old American Royal livestock pavilion was in the path of the flames, but was saved. A new fire station in the course of construction in the stockyards district was partly destroyed.

The fire started at a fertilizer plant at the south end of the yards and was swept into the sheep pens before a high south wind.

Many of the sheep were guided into lanes and driven safely in other parts of the yards. One goat was seen leading seventy-five sheep to safety through an open gate. Thirty goats which were used to lead the sheep to the packing houses perished.

From the sheep pens the fire swept to a row of mile barns. Several thousand mules were turned out and saved. Thousands of spectators, who thronged the streets, stock lanes and fences were in danger of their lives when the mules stampeded. The frightened animals were finally headed into a stock pen.

Sparks from the burning pens set fire to a school building five blocks away. The pupils already had been dismissed.

The school building was saved. Tons of trolley poles were burned off, and live wires sputtering in the streets added to the danger to spectators. At four o'clock, one hour and ten minutes after it broke out, the fire was under control. The damage is estimated at less than \$50,000.

## REALTY DEALS IN PRAIRIE CITY

Central Congregational Church in Winnipeg Makes \$30,000 Profit on Site Purchased a Year Ago.

WINNIPEG, May 18.—Central Congregational church here has cleared \$30,000 by re-selling a new site purchased by its trustees about a year ago. This wipes out the debt and puts fifteen thousand to the credit of the building fund. The present property on Hartgrave street is held at \$200,000.

The Quebec bank has bought sixty-one feet on the south side of Portage avenue, a few feet off Main street, for \$4,250 a foot. The site being covered by the bank's new company's block, which will be pulled down, when the leases run out and a big office building erected.

## JEW OF KIEV ARE IN DANGER

Circulation of Story About Ritualistic Murder of Christian Youth Probably Preliminary to Massacre.

ST. PETERSBURG, May 18.—The serious situation which has arisen through the threatened massacre of Jews at Kiev, following the finding of the body of a boy under such circumstances as to raise the cry of a "ritualistic murder," has aroused the authorities in their endeavor to avert the tragedy of the boy's death. Meanwhile the anti-Jewish newspapers admit that the reports on which the agitation is based for the most part are not worthy of credence.

In an interview today, Mr. Slobodskoy, a leading Jewish lawyer, exhaustively reviewed the history of the question of the ritualistic murder as contained in the reports of the courts of Russia, and abroad. He said that hardly a year passed without a revival of the old myth about the Easter times in connection with the temporary disappearance of a boy or girl, or in connection with some unexplained murder. The ignorant masses were excited, and their excitement became a danger to the Jews.

In the majority of cases it was shown that no murder had been committed, and in the other cases, the murder was traced to the culpable elements and it was proved that Jews had no connection with them.

Mr. Slobodskoy said that in the present case, the killing of the boy Yushchinsky, no information was obtainable. The investigation has yielded no results, or the results were not ready for publication. All that could be said was that no Jew had been arrested yet, or implicated.

It was suspected, when the body was found in a cave near a Jewish quarter, that the Jewish sect Hassidim, which is alleged to forbid the burial of ritualistic victims, may have had some knowledge of the case.

With respect to the Hassidim, Mr. Slobodskoy said that the Jews of Russia are divided into two classes, the Hassidim, meaning pious, and the Menakdim, meaning opponents. The two exist side by side. Adherence to either sect depends upon the temperament of individuals or communities.

The use of blood is equally abhorrent to both denominations.

**Year Massacre.**
