## GREAT BRITAIN ASKS FOR 20,000 TROOPS

Nearly Twice the Number are Anxious to get Away—Battalions Not Named Yet

Ottawa, Jan. 31.—Britain has sent the message, Canada's training troops have been eagerly expecting for weeks. The Motherland has asked for the despatch across the Atlantic of 20,000 additional Canadian fighting men. Nearly twice the number are ready and within the next two or three months twenty more Canadian battalions will encamp in England to await the final summons to the front. The competition among the waiting ready battalions will be keen and, insofar as the Militia Department can determine, the selection of the fortunate twenty will be in order of merit.

General Hughes is enthusiastic over the outlook for raising the immense Canadian army of half a million. Within the past few days, he stated, he had received orders from Regina, which city is sending 2,500 additional men. Swift Current, Saskatchewan, has offered to raise a battalion, an offer which has been accepted, while Mr. Edward King has written from the Peace River district offering to bring down a battalion from that northern outpost. The Minister has also availed himself of this offer.

## SARGT. WALLACE SHOWS ST. JOHN HOCKEY

Credit for Brilliant Work on Ice

Papers Give Campbellton Boy Credit for Brilliant Work on Ice

It's hard to keep a good man down, and it's hard also to keep a good hockey player off the ice. Sargt. H. Wallace of this town is making a name for himself at St. John, according to reports published in the St. John papers. Here is what they say of a recent hockey game:

"In the best game seen on local ice for several seasons the men of the Fourth Siege Battery defeated the 140th team by a score of 6 to 1.

"The score is no indication of the calibre of the struggle, the 140th men, even when the score got on the wrong side of the ledger, did not slacken their efforts one whit but stuck to it like grim death and gave the Siege Battery boys a run for their money from the face off to the end of the third period.

"Wallace of the Siege Battery was easily the best man on the ice. He is an exponent of the art of big league calibre and if he sticks to the game he will be heard from in the future. He is a clever stick handler, but beside does not depend on his individual brilliancy to win the day. He plays in concert with the other members of the team, never lags and back checks with all his might, with the result that he is there on the rubber when most needed.

"The Siege Battery is much elated over their victory and believe that they can take the measure of the city team if they get good ice, and critics agree that they will give that fast aggregation a battle which they will remember at any rate.

"Wallace of the Siege Battery was responsible for five of the six goals during the evening and the other score was notched by N. Macaulay who played a good game along the left boards."

## OFFICIAL CANADIAN GOVT. FILMS COMING

"Canada's Fighting Forces" at Opera Houses, Campbellton and Dalhousie.

"Canada's Fighting Forces", the six reel official motion pictures of the Canadian government, which will be shown at the Opera House in Campbellton on Feb. 9 and 10, and in Dalhousie on Feb. 11th, have already made a great success in many parts of Canada. In Ottawa Their Royal Highnesses the Duke and Duchess of Connaught and the Princess Patricia were in attendance, and at the close of the performance called Lieut. D. J. Dwyer, of the 30th Battalion, to the royal box, and complimented him on the pictures, which he took for the militia department. Corporal White, D. C. M. hero of Ypres, was likewise honored, and complimented upon his vivid description of that great battle of general conditions at the front, with which he accompanied the motion pictures.

In Toronto the "Mail and Empire" commenting upon them, said under the heading of "Graphic Pictures of the Great War—Deals in Striking Manner with Doings of Canadian Troops," say in their editorial columns:—

"To get some idea of what Canada has contributed of her fine young manhood to fight the Kaiser's legions one should see the moving pictures of the Canadian contingents at Massey Hall this week, starting at the embarkation of the Highlanders of Victoria on board a C. P. R. liner for Vancouver and the last, one journey with the brave boys across the continent, across the Atlantic on the troopship right to Queenstown, where the soldiers meet a real Irish welcome."

"Many splendid reviews of different divisions of the troops are shown. Some at Salisbury and at Shorncliffe. Scenes at the various hospitals show just what care and comfort the wounded heroes get. The King, and Kitchener on his famous white charger, frequently appear. Also Sir Sam and later Premier Sir Robert Borden. Perhaps the scenes at the battle front arouse the most interest, men in the trenches, digging the trenches, others getting the range for the big guns, the dash across country to the front trenches, reveal some of the dangers that are hourly the lot of those at the front."

"King Albert of Belgium and President Poincare decorating some wounded French soldiers, evoke loud applause. None was more interesting than that showing Sargt. Wells telling how he lost his left arm, and also going through the "goose step" that he learned in his four months' confinement in a German prison camp. The pictures are very clear and each one seems to be more interesting than the one preceding."

## ARTHUR O'KEEFE KILLED IN ACTION

Second in Family to Die for His Country on the Battlefield

Mrs. Daniel O'Keefe received a telegram from Ottawa Tuesday morning, informing her that her son Arthur J. of the Princess Pats, had died on Jan. 23rd from the effects of a gunshot wound in the abdomen. This is the second son that Mrs. O'Keefe has given.

Arthur went over with the first Canadian Contingent, but was transferred to the Princess Pats, together with his brother Dan and some others. Arthur was twice wounded, but not severely.

Arthur J. O'Keefe was the eldest son of the late Daniel and Mrs. O'Keefe of this town. He was very popular and an enthusiastic curler, being rated as one of the best in the local club and the province. Hardly a foreign match was played without Art, as he was familiarly called. To him was given the credit of winning the McLellan cup from Chatham a few years ago, when his last stone scored. Anything Art. went into he did with a will, and as a soldier he was as much thought of by his comrades as he was among his friends at home.

Besides his mother he leaves three sisters, Mrs. W. S. Montgomery, Mrs. D. VanHorne and Mrs. Chas. Dalton, and two brothers, Hugh and Ray, to mourn his loss.

He has fought his last fight and died upon the field of glory. All honor to our brave boys who are willing to do and die for those of us who they leave behind. May his going be a call to many to offer to fill the gaps.

## 55TH BATT. NOW

UNDER COL. SMART

Forms Part of 15th Infantry Brigade.—Another Move in Final Stage

Montreal, Feb. 2.—Colonel Chas. A. Smart, of Westmount, who left Montreal in command of the 2nd Brigade, Canadian Mounted Rifles, has been appointed brigadier of the 15th Infantry Brigade at Bramshott camp, England.

The brigade consists of 4,400 men, composed of the 34th Battalion from London, the 35th Battalion from Toronto, the 40th Battalion from Halifax, and the 55th Battalion from New Brunswick and Prince Edward Island.

This is another move in the final preparations before leaving for France.
