CLINCHED BY THE SENATE. The Members of the Red Chamber and the Combines Bill ;

OTTAWA, April 29. - The Senate this aftertoon considered in committee of the whole he Anti-Combines Bill, when a considerable iscussion occurred. An amendment moved by Senator Vidal was adopted qualifying the enacting clauses by inserting the word "unduly" before the definition of the offences made punishable at common law. The bill therefore, is made to read :

made punishable at common law. The bill, therefore, is made to read:

Whoever may be guilty of combining, conspiring, arranging or agreeing to unduly regulate the cost of transportation or limit the production of goods or unreasonably enhance the prices of commodities shall be subject to the penalties prescribed.

The principal fight was over clause 5 in the bill as passed by the Commons, a clause which has unnecessarily disturbed the Trades and Labor Council of Toronto. It provided that in construing the act section 22 of the Trades Unions Act should not apply except in so far as it related to those engaged in handicraft. Under this section of the Trades Union Act combinations in restraint of trade are legalized, whether they apply to masters or workmen, that is to say a trades union organization of working men was given legal recognition, but at the same time a combination of manu facturers or merchants was also made lawful. The object of the fifth clause of the Wallace bill was to nullify so much of section 22 of the Trades Union Act as applied to the latter classes but to exempt the workingmen and permit them to carry on their trade organizations under the protection of the law.

Some of the senators appeared to regard this descrimination as class legislation, and it was of the Trades Union Act should have force in to of the Trades Union Act should have force in construing the provision of the Wallace bill. Libel Suit. MONTREAL, April 29. -To-day McLaren Leet, Smith & Smith filed in the Superior Court the first plea of The Toronto Mail in the suit which the Society of Jesus has brought

against that journal. It sets forth that the mmons and declaration are irregular, informal, null and void, because the society is not a body politic and incorporate, as the writ and declaration declare, and therefore it cannot sue The Mail under the title of

it cannot sue The Mail under the title of the Society of Jesus.

A furtifer reason alleged for their inability to sue is that by the laws of the British Empire and the Province of Quebec its members are absolutely without oivil rights; moreover their vows preclude them from exercising such rights if they possessed them. The rules of the society prevent individual members from holding property. The Legislature, it is said, is incompetent to create the Society of Jesus a corporate reate the Society of Jesus a corporate ody because the act which purports make ing them such is repugnant to Imperial statutes in force in this province relating to the society in question. The Legislature possesses only the rights to incorporate companies with provincial objects and the bijects of the society are not provincial.

Another objection taken to the act is that it fails to define the objects of the society, nor in any way restricts it to objects pro vincial, but wholly on the contrary. A strong fault found is that the chief of

the society is an alien not resident in this Province, nor in the British Empire, and his very position renders him unable to come a British subject. It is pointed out that the general teachings of the society abrogate all power to the Pope, leaving everything to his discretion and would have it believed that neither the British Government nor the Provincial Legislature had even a secondary power as regards the civil and religious lives of Roman
