It was in this house that General Fremont met the warring Mexican chief General Andres Pico at dinner on a July evening in 1846. Here the treaty was signed giving over to the Americans the whole of California. This house is the oldest one in South Pasadena or, in fact, the whole valley in this section.—Los Angeles Times.
