HAMPTON

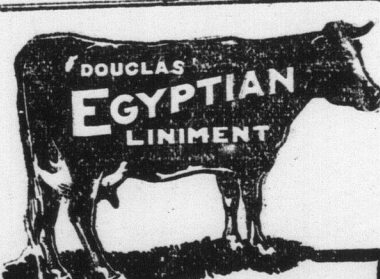
