This is all the more extraordinary because the growth of the Associaary because the growth of the Associa-tion outside the city is very satisfactory. This must be remedied. We should all make it our business to canvass for and bring in new members. These members should, as far as possible, be young men. So long as we can keep up the accession of young members soon to have the satisfact. of young members, so as to keep down the average minimum age limit, and thus reduce the number of assessments, we can the assured of our stability and per-petuity. But only work on the part of each and every member will accomplish the end desired. Unless also new blood be introduced in the branches, the members grow old and rusty.
