Ir you cut the back legs of your chair two inches shorter than the front ones the fatigue of sitting will be greately relieved, and the pine placed in a better position.

A CARPET, especially a dark one, often looks dusty, when it does not need sweepings wet a sponge in water (a few drops of ammonia helps to brighten the colour), wring it dry, and wipe off the dust.

Fon Frion.—Take equal parts of gum camphor, gum opium, castile soap, and brown sugar; wet to a paste with spirits of turpentine. Prepare it, and apply a thick plaster of it.
